THE DEBATE AT PROSPERITY.

What Senator Butler Would Report About His Meeting with President Stokes.

[From the Baltimore Sun.]

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Senator M. C. Butler, of South Carolina, arrived here today from Edgefield, S. C., having completely used up two sub-treasury claims in an open joint debate at Prosperity.

There were a number of interrupters scattered through the crowd, but the Senator's long experience in the Senate as a running debate enabled him to dispose of his supposed tormentors without much trouble. On every hand he was greeted by the joint debate, and also because he was not injured in the row which followed the meeting.

He says the reports of the row were greatly exaggerated, as he had no quarrel with any of the political meeting. It appears two men in the crowd undertook to get even with a police officer who had on a previous occasion arrested them.

The officer, who was a young giant, knocked his men out after the manner of a trained prize fighter. Several pistol shots were fired and there was some cutting done, but the participants were in no way connected with the meeting.

Senator Butler will go to New York to join the members of the Senate committee on naval affairs, who were authorized at the last session of Congress to sit during the recess for the purpose of considering the question of the reorganization of the navy.

THE FREE SILVER IDEA.

On the subject of general politics Senator Butler says the people of South Carolina are too busy with their own State affairs to give much attention to the selection of Presidential nominees.

He says the free silver idea prevails there to such an extent that his views on the question may interfere with his Presidential prospects. Senator Butler had the statement of the free silver theory, because he claims it will increase the circulation of the currency.

At present there is a scarcity of money all through the Southern States, and the people in that section are very anxious to see the free silver law give them more money.
