Deaths. One of Newberry County's most promising young men cut down in the prime of life—A. E. P. Bodenbaugh of an illness of six weeks quietly passed away at his home near S. Lukes on the evening of Tuesday, January 1st. Mr. Bodenbaugh graduated from Newberry college in 1894 but while yet a student at that institution was connected with the press—first as local editor of the Prosperity Press and Reporter then of the Voice of the People and later on as editor of the Voice of the People after its removal to Prosperity. To this work he seemed well suited. His writings showed marked ability and profound thought. Apart from his private life he was a prominent and active public spirit. In 1897 he was elected Supervisor of Registration and served one term in this capacity which was his first public service. For a while he was County Chairman of the Democratic Convention. He resigned this office before leaving for Washington in July to accept an appointment as a clerk on the census returns in the Department of the Interior and was at this post of duty when he developed the case of consumption which caused his death.

Mr. Bodenbaugh although only 31 years of age was a man who by his honesty and honorable dealings in business matters, had completely won the confidence of the people and he will be missed by those who knew and appreciated him. He is dead but the memory of his life will serve a living monument to his worth. Annual Banquet of K. of P.
