The warrant for the arrest was turned over to Sheriff Buford by the Sheriff of Laurens who had learned that Sheriff Buford had facts in his possession which would probably lead to the capture.

Soon after receiving the warrant, the sheriff in company with Messrs. Will Miller and Henry Todd, went to Lewiedale. Arriving in Lewiedale on Friday afternoon they drove to the plantation of Dr. James Drafts, near Priceville, where they succeeded in making the capture.

The prisoner, who had assumed the name of Thomas Allen, has been delivered to the sheriff of Laurens County. It was a good piece of work, and quickly and quietly done.
