WASHINGTON, February 17.—The majority and minority Ku Klux reports are nearly ready. They agree that nearly all the Southern States are approaching financial ruin from bad legislation and Ku Kluxism. One report attributes the bad legislation to the Ku Klux; the other attributes the Ku Klux to bad legislation.

MR. PUNCH'S LITTLE BILL.—The London Punch brings a bill against Brother Jonathan for indirect damages, among which are the following items:

For the use of the works of ancient English authors, from William Shakespeare downwards, and for calling them American authors. £100,000,000

For piracy on modern English authors, and for not calling a great many of them American authors. 100,000,000

For insulting the King's or Queen's English by speaking it, for 50 years, nasally. 20,000,000

For attempting to destroy the monarchical principles of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, by treating him with so much kindness and hospitality that his Royal Highness was induced to think well of Republicans. 100,000,000

For inventing Hans Breitmann, instead of leaving

to some Englishman the honor of inventing him. 100,000

Punch also has an item for twenty years of violent abuse poured upon England by the New York Herald, for which it charges two and a half pence. The bill is signed Gladstone and Punch.

THE PROPOSED LICENSE LAW.—It requires for brokers a license of \$100; billiard tables or ten pin alleys, \$50; hotels, inns, taverns and saloons, from \$500 to \$50, according to rental value; merchants, from \$250 to \$10, according to amount of sales; banks, from \$5000 to \$250, according to capital; railroads, from \$1000 to \$150, according to length of road; auctioneers, in Richland and Charleston Counties, \$100; in other counties, \$50; miners and phosphate manufacturers, from \$300 upwards, being \$50 extra for every \$100 of capital over \$5000; lawyers, \$10; telegraph companies, \$50 for the first fifty miles of line, and \$25 for every additional fifty miles; express companies and common carriers of that kind, \$250.

Not to comply with this bill is made a criminal, to be enforced by indictment, to be punished with a fine of double the amount of the license, and as much more as the judge may inflict; and to be imprisoned not less than six months.

The bill is suicidal. It should be entitled a bill to prevent the carrying on or the conduct of business and industry in the State of South Carolina.

A STRONG effort is to be made in Louisiana to secure the passage of a local prohibition law.
