FROM WASHINGTON.

NEWSY ITEMS PICKED UP AT THE NATIONAL CAPITOL.

Sayings and Doings of the Official Heads of the Government.

Civil Service Commissioner Proctor says by the time Mr. Cleveland goes out of office nearly all government employes will be under the civil service rules, and then it will be useless for congressmen to chafe about the departments for offices. Then, he says, congressmen may devote their attention to matters of legislation.

It is probable that the diplomatic correspondence relative to Bluefields will not be sent to congress before the holidays. This delay is caused by no unwillingness on the part of the state department to furnish the information, but by the great volume of the correspondence which covers a period of two years, and will probably make the largest diplomatic document sent to congress in many years.

General John C. Black, of Illinois, a representative in the present congress, but defeated for the next, has been provided for by the president. Mr. Cleveland has appointed him United States attorney for the northern district of Illinois. General Black was commissioner of pensions during Mr. Cleveland's first term and he is the first of the unfortunates of congress who are provided for.

The president has approved the acts providing for the dedication of the Chickamauga and Chattanooga national parks, and to enable the secretary of the treasury to remit or mitigate fines, penalties, or forfeitures; also the joint resolution to pay the officers and employees of the senate and house of representatives their respective salaries for the month of December on the 20th instant.

Examination for Postal Clerks.
The next regular examination for admission to the classified postal service will be held at all of the free delivery offices on the first Saturday of June, with the exception of the following fifty-three offices that were classified prior to January 5, 1893:

Chicago, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus, Ohio; Dallas, Texas; Dayton, Ohio; Denver, Col.; Des Moines, Ia.; Detroit, Mich.; Grand Rapids, Mich.; Indianapolis, Ind.; Kansas City, Mo.; Los Angeles, Cal.; Louisville, Memphis, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, New Orleans, La.; Portland, Me.; St. Louis, Mo.; St. Paul, San Francisco and Toledo.

In these offices the examination will be held as heretofore, on the first Tuesdays of February and August and on the succeeding days where the examinations cannot be completed in one day. In all other free delivery offices the regular semi-examinations will hereafter be held on the first Saturdays of June and December. Provisions will be made for an extra examination between the first Saturday of next June, if necessary, and if requested by the board of examiners. The change of dates has been found necessary in order to facilitate the work of the board of examiners.

WHO IS GOVERNOR?

TENNESSEE'S OFFICIAL POSITION IS IN FAVOR OF EVANS.

White Turney's Friends Claim That He Will Get It.

A Nashville special says: Secretary of State Morgan has just received the poll lists and tally sheets from Roano county, thus completing the returns, and has made public the official vote for governor.

The figures give Evans (Republican) 105,104; Turney (Democrat) 104,356, and Mims (populist) 23,092. Evans' plurality is therefore 918.

The canvassing board is proceeding to canvass the vote for assemblymen. There will doubtless be a contest for the governorship before the legislature. Both sides are claiming fraud and collecting evidence.

DEMOCRATS SAY TURNERY IS ELECTED.
Another Nashville dispatch is as follows: The official vote for governor as just given out makes Evans' plurality 718. The democrats in a general way claim that the poll tax law was disregarded in East Tennessee, and that in some of the counties in that part of the state, which is republican, frauds can be shown sufficiently to elect Governor Turney. It is therefore probable that the legislature will have to consider a contest for the office.

At the republican headquarters it is claimed that the election laws were observed in but few of the rural districts in west Tennessee and in not many rural districts in middle Tennessee, that in Fayette and Lauderdale counties, which are democratic, gross frauds were perpetrated, as shown by the affidavits of a large number of men who swear that they voted for Evans, notwithstanding the fact that the official returns do not show that the votes were cast.

TO PAY IN MARCH.

THE TIME DESIGNATED FOR COLLECTION OF INCOME TAX.

The Secretary of the Treasury Talks of Its Regulations.

The secretary of the treasury Thursday approved the income tax regulations. Every citizen of the United States, whether residing at home or abroad, and every person residing or doing business in the United States who has an annual income of more than \$3,500 is required to make return, under oath, before the first Monday in March of each year. The return is to include all incomes received in the year 1894, from January 1st to December 31st. Guardians, trustees and all corporations acting in any fiduciary capacity are required to make similar returns for minors, wards or beneficiaries. Persons having less than \$3,500 annual income are not required to make returns. All incomes of \$4,000 and over are taxable 2 per cent.

The person making the return is required to make affidavit that he has included in such return all gains, profits and income from every source whatever received by him, or to which he is justly entitled for that year and that he is honestly and truly entitled to make all the deductions entered on his return, and that he has truthfully answered the interrogatories set forth on a blank form.

The gross gains, profits and income returned by persons are to include gross profits of any trade or business wherever carried on, rents received or accrued during the year, profits from sales of real estate purchased within two years, farming operations and proceeds, money and value of all personal property acquired by gift or inheritance, premiums on bonds, stocks, notes and coupons; income from trade or profession not by stated salary and not heretofore enumerated; from salary or compensation other than that received from the United States; from salary or compensation paid by the United States; undivided gains and profits of any partnership; interest received or accrued from all notes, bonds or other securities; interest on bonds or coupons paid by any corporation; dividends from corporations; income of wife or minor children or child; all other sources of income not above enumerated.

Deductions Allowed.

turns are: Four thousand dollars exempt by law; interest due and paid within the year; national, state, county, school and municipal taxes paid, not including assessments for local benefits; amount expended in purchase and product of live stock or produce sold within the year; necessary expenses specified by items actually incurred in carrying on business or trade; losses actually sustained during the year, specified; actual losses on sales of real estate purchased within two years; debts contracted and ascertained in the year; salary or compensation over \$4,000 from which the tax of 2 per cent has been withheld by the disbursing officers of the United States government; dividends included in the estimates of gross profits from corporations on which the 2 per cent tax has been paid by such corporations.

If any person fails to make return or makes false return, the collector is to make return for him from evidence obtained by summoning the person and examining his books, and from all other evidence obtainable, and shall add 50 per cent to the tax fund due as a penalty for neglect and 100 per cent for a fraudulent return.

All corporations, companies and associations, both resident and foreign, doing business in the United States are required to make annual return of net profits on a separate blank to cover the calendar year 1894. The exemption of \$4,000 allowed to persons is not extended to corporations, but the return must cover all net profits without exemption. The annual return of corporations must include:

The gross profits from all kinds of business, the expenses, exclusive of interest, annuities or dividends; the net profits, without allowance for interest, annuities or dividends; the amount paid on account of interest, annuities and dividends; the amount paid in salaries of \$4,000 or less to each employe.

A RAILROAD PURCHASED.

An Issue of \$650,000 in Bonds Authorized by the N., C. & St. L.

A called meeting of the stockholders of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis railway was held at Nashville Wednesday with 81,201 shares out of 100,000 represented, mostly by proxy. The purchase of the stock of the Rome railroad, of Georgia, extending eighteen miles from Kingston to Rome, was endorsed and a resolution was adopted authorizing the issuance of \$650,000 of 3 per cent income bonds on the Western and Atlantic railroad, the proceeds to be used to reimburse the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis for money expended in improvements.

POLLOCK DECLINES.

He is Under Contract and Cannot be School Commissioner.

Professor P. D. Pollock has declined to accept the position of state school commissioner of Georgia, to which he was recently appointed by Governor Atkinson. His reasons are that the board of trustees for Mercer university refuses to release him from the contract he has with them.

Hardware Men Organizing.

A large number of leading wholesale hardware men from all parts of the country met in session at Chicago Thursday for the formation, if possible, of a national association of hardware men and a general discussion of the hardware and bair trade.

DEBS CONVICTED.

SENTENCED TO SERVE SIX MONTHS IN JAIL.

Others of the American Railway Union Men Get Three Months.

At Chicago, Saturday, Judge Woods sentenced Eugene V. Debs, the leader of the American Railway Union strike, to six months in the county jail, as a punishment for violating the injunction issued by himself and Judge Grosscup, July last. To the rest of the men, with the exception of McVean, he gave three months. In the case of McVean sentence is suspended. Sentence is not cumulative, covering the cases of the government and the Santa Fe railroad against the men. The same sentence is imposed in each case, but the sentences begin and end at the same time, December 24th. The defendants are: E. V. Debs, president; Sylvester Keliher, secretary; L. W. Rodgers, M. J. Elliott, James Hogan, William Burns, J. D. McVean, Leroy M. Goodwin. The sentence is generally considered a light one. The case will be appealed.

In speaking of the decision Attorney Darrow, who represented the defendants, said: "The decision is bad law, but the sentence is remarkably lenient." Mr. Howard said he was prepared to expect anything. President Debs was more cast down than any of the others. It was in the discretion of the court to sentence them to any term of years he chose, within constitutional limits and to impose any fine he thought fit.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEVITIES.

The president sent to the senate Thursday the nomination of Jervis Spencer, of Maryland, to be consul of the United States at Curacao, West Indies.

A special from Lima, Peru, says that ministers from Columbia, Ecuador and Peru have signed a protocol submitting the boundary dispute to Spain as arbitrator.

Byron Myers and George Wheeler have been arrested at Caldwell, Idaho, for counterfeiting. Wheeler is thought to be the head of a gang operating extensively. Myers is a farmer.

The courthouse at Lewiston, Id., was totally burned early Saturday morning. Most of the records were saved. The building was erected in 1839, and Abraham Lincoln delivered a famous speech in it in 1838.

M. Tobacco and Cigar Co., of Mobile, Ala., capital \$20,000.
