SERIOUS CHARGE AGAINST NEGRO

ALLEGED TO HAVE ATTEMPTED ASSAULT AT EASLEY.

Pete Hamilton Held—Pickens Officers Find Clues Pointing to Guilt—Citizens Aroused by Crime.

Easley, Nov. 9.—Pete Hamilton, a young negro some 20 or 22 years of age, was arrested here this morning being charged with attempted assault on a prominent white woman in a residence shortly before midnight Saturday night. The evidence, warranting his arrest, although circumstantial, is sufficiently strong to assure the citizens that the guilty one has really been apprehended. In making his escape from the residence Saturday night the fleeing person was seen to fall over a large log on the edge of the sidewalk. Here he also lost one of his shoes which was found by the officers working on the case. Hamilton is an employe of the oil mill and this shoe which was found had cottonseed hulls in it. The make of the shoe was identified as one which had been purchased by Hamilton one month ago. Hamilton had a sore on his foot and the shoe which was found had a hole split in it and this cut out place exactly fitted over the sore. Hamilton failed to appear at the oil mill this morning and sent word that he had the mumps. The officers, in view of all other circumstances, carried a physician to Hamilton's house where an examination disclosed the fact that he had no mumps but that his knees were freshly skinned and badly swollen. Minor scratches were also found on his face. An arrest was immediately made and Hamilton was rushed to the county jail at Pickens.

Two women were occupying the same room on the ground floor of the residence. The presence of the man in the room was not discovered until he had grabbed one of the young women around the throat and her screams awakened the other persons sleeping in the house. A broken latch on the window blind had enabled the man to make an entrance noiselessly as the window was up. The screams of the young woman not only aroused the other persons in the house but awakened the nearby neighbors who rushed to their assistance. The negro left the house as he had entered, rushed across the front yard and belted a high wire fence. A neighbor saw him at this moment and fired at him but the bullet missed its mark. Some pedestrians who happened on the street and hearing the screams started toward the house and met the fleeing negro whom they could not halt since they were unarmed. They engaged in pursuit, however, but the negro dodged them shortly after the chase had started.

The news of the arrest spread rapidly and within a few minutes a mob of 505 or 75 men had formed about to go to Pickens to demand the prisoner. Several citizens, however, talked calmly to the mob and finally persuaded the members to disperse without carrying out the plan. Gov. Manning was called over the telephone and he gave assurances that a special term of court would be ordered.

CARNEGIE HAS GIVEN AWAY OVER \$350,000,000.

New York, Nov. 29.—Andrew Carnegie has a fortune today of \$20,000,000. Of the vast wealth which the iron master possessed when he started giving away his fortune 20 years ago in conformity with his principle of dying poor, that is all he has left. He is now far down on the list of America's millionaires.

Mr. Carnegie has given away about \$350,000,000. If interest were to be included on some of the funds he has set aside, the total would reach nearly \$400,000,000. This sum he has given away in pursuance of his belief, as expressed by Dr. Henry S. Pritchett, president of the Carnegie foundation, in his address Wednesday in Pittsburgh, that the man who dies possessed of great wealth, and who devotes no part of it to the public use, has failed in life.

Devised Remainder to Charity.
 The fortune of \$20,000,000 which Mr. Carnegie has left he has devised in his will almost entirely to charity. Very little will go to his family. Thus, when his will is made public, it will be found that he really made good his boast of dying poor. There is, strictly speaking, no record like his in this or any other country. The actual amount of Mr. Carnegie's present fortune was disclosed today by one of the ironmaster's closest friends, a man who has had the direction of the disposal of much of this great wealth. While preferring that his name be not used, this friend made it clear that he believed the time had come to make known the extent of Mr. Carnegie's wealth today in proof of his deep sincerity of purpose, and of the manner in which he had carried out his formula of the responsibility of private wealth.

It was the remarks made by Dr. Pritchett at the Carnegie birthday celebration in Pittsburgh that led the correspondent of the Virginian to make this inquiry as to the exact wealth today of Andrew Carnegie. In that address, occasioned by the eightieth birthday of the ironmaster and Pittsburgh's benefactor, Dr. Pritchett spoke of Mr. Carnegie as possessing today only a "moderate fortune," after giving away nearly \$400,000,000. He declared he had made vital the conception that the owner of great wealth was a trustee for the public, obligated to divide it for the public use.

Money Turned Back to Public.
 "The most noteworthy thing about Mr. Carnegie's preaching of the doctrine of the consecration of wealth," Dr. Pritchett added, "is the fact that his practice has squared with his preaching. The great bulk of his accumulations, nearly \$400,000,000, has been turned back by him to the public to be used in the cause of human betterment. He is today a man of moderate fortune."

This utterance of the head of the Carnegie foundation has served only to increase the speculation concerning the actual extent of Mr. Carnegie's present wealth, speculation that has been indulged in generally ever since Mr. Carnegie began years ago to announce his immense benefactions. That most of the computations made have been far from the mark is indicated by the facts disclosed today.

Gives Real Figure.
 It was when a definition was sought of President Pritchett's term "moderate fortune" that this close friend of Mr. Carnegie was induced to give the real figures of Mr. Carnegie's present wealth. He coupled this with the assertion that, of course, fortunes were largely relative, that the term moderate applied to a fortune in the case of a man who had given away nearly \$400,000,000, was not to be accepted as meaning the same as in the case of a person of the average competence.

But however small a fortune of \$20,000,000 may be relatively in comparison with the amount of Mr. Carnegie's total benefactions, it does not mean, as this close friend of Mr. Carnegie explained, that the latter believed he has fulfilled his purpose. It was in this connection that this friend made known the fact that Mr. Carnegie's will devises almost his entire remaining wealth to charity.

NEGLECT OF TOOLS LOSES THOUSANDS

Clemson College, Nov. 22.—One of the best and simplest ways for farmers to save money is by taking care of their tools and machinery. Authorities on the subject at Clemson college say there is no doubt that South Carolina farmers lose thousands of dollars each year by neglecting their implements. Exposing a piece of machinery to the weather for a long period is almost certain to cause depreciation. Every farmer should have a tool shed where he can keep all tools and machines while they are not in use. No expensive shed is necessary, the principal point being to have some shelter that will keep the implements dry.

Having finished using a machine for the season, put it under the shed and clean the dirt and rust from every part. Then apply a coat of paint. A good paint for all farm implements can be made with red lead and linseed oil. Painting machinery is one of the best methods of prolonging its period of usefulness.

Every machine should be inspected carefully at least once a year. When any part is found to be broken or missing, make a note of the part on a tag and fasten the tag to the machine. Then, when there is time to spare for ordering parts, there will be no danger of forgetting or overlooking anything that is needed. The essentials of caring for farm implements are housing, repairing, oiling, cleaning and painting.
