CRIMINAL COURT.

Will Pelham Found Guilty of Manslaughter and Sentenced.
This morning's session of court was taken up with the case against Will Pelham for murder. When the case was given to the jury they agreed in a short time upon a verdict of guilty of manslaughter and he was sentenced by the court to serve four years in the penitentiary.
The case against James Miller for car breaking and larceny was finished and he was found not guilty.
Yesterday afternoon the following cases were disposed of:
Mack Hampton was found not guilty of violation of dispensary law.
A. H. Floyd, violating dispensary law, was found guilty and recommended to the mercy of the court. He was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 or serve three months.
Lury and Camp Williams pleaded guilty to violation of dispensary law and were sentenced to \$100 or 90 days.
Henry Hollis, Charlie Littlejohn and Herman Tracy pleaded guilty to car breaking and larceny. Charlie Littlejohn was sentenced to twelve months and Henry Hollis and Herman Tracy were each given nine months on the chaingang.
Court will adjourn sine die this afternoon.
GRAND JURY PRESENTMENT.
Following is the presentment of the grand jury:
Hon. R. C. Watts, presiding judge: We the grand jurors beg leave to submit the following presentment:
We have conscientiously passed on and considered all bills of indictment handed to us by the solicitor. We are sorry to report that we had before us quite a number of dispensary cases which seemed to us to have no merit in them, and we accordingly found no bill in such cases. We suggest that the officers charged with bringing prosecutions for violation of the dispensary law be more cautious in sending up the cases and send only those which have genuine merit. By doing so, much unnecessary expense will be saved to the county. We recommend that all willful violations of the dispensary or any other law be vigorously prosecuted. We would also suggest that the magistrates of the county bind only material witnesses. A large part of the expense of enforcing the law is paying the witnesses who have nothing about the cases.
