A SUCCESSFUL DRY FARMER

W. N. Merchant, the successful candidate for county treasurer, has demonstrated that he is a practical farmer. Besides dealing with politics, cattle and numerous other side issues he is developing a dry land farm. Three years ago he established a residence on a homestead claim south of Carlsbad three miles and erected a neat three room house thereon and has since that time made it his bonfied residence as all his neighbors will assert. He has expended considerable means on the place with the idea of making it his permanent home and he now has a fine growth of shade trees, fruit trees and vines and one of the finest garden patches grown anywhere in the valley. He has about twenty or thirty acres under cultivation and has just now harvested his crop of milo maize. From a patch of about eleven acres he has gathered about eight tons of maize besides a fine stack of fodder which will supply him with feed for the coming winter. He has a flock of chickens which more than supplies his table with meat and eggs as well as contributing largely towards supplying the local market. Mr. Merchant has planted dry land crops in Eddy county for the past nine years and on an average he has met with success. For seven years he planted feed stuff on the San Simoh Ranch, in the plains country, and as a dry land farmer he claims to be an authority. —Carlsbad Argus.
