

Lynch Is To Hang. Prospect For New Railroad.

Action in New Trial is Over-ruled by the Executive Com- mittee of the Bar From the Colleen.

Jim Lynch has been denied a new hearing by the motion of his attorneys was overruled by Judge Clarence J. Roberts the special trial judge, at Carlsbad. That means, without executive clemency that Lynch will hang for the killing of City Marshal Woolfer at Roswell.

The whole tragedy has its pathetic side lights. It portrays in its many phases, the old law of the protection to murderers and the keeping inviolate its sanctity from any kind of interference—legally or otherwise.

On the other hand, there is the majesty of the law of the land, that says no man shall use this guaranteed sanctity of the home as a blind for the violation of the law.

And in this case the benign influences of the wife were absent, as Mrs. Lynch was on a visit in Texas.

Then there was Woolfer trying to make the enforcement of the law as easy as he could. In doing so, he let Lynch go to his home, permitted him to enter another room than that where the officers were. Lynch locked the door and refused to come out. Even then Woolfer did not give up the idea that he could possibly take Lynch and started to a side entrance to try to get a chance to talk to him, and as he turned the corner was shot down—as Lynch admits—but as he claims in self-defense.

The sin and crime rests as much on a great part of the citizenship of Roswell as on Lynch, for permitting, aiding, and abetting in such open violation of the law.

With Roswell's \$100,000, One-Fifth of Money to Construct is Ready.

The plan for Roswell and adjoining territory to build a road from here east to connect with the Texas Central at Rotan, Texas, is creating much interest not only locally, but with the outlying District.

The Roswell Commercial club has just received the following letter from T. C. Carrington, secretary of the Midland Texas Commercial club, which gives a new light on the question.

Roswell is ready to put up \$100,000 and with Midland putting up its \$100,000, one-fifth of the cost of the road is subscribed. The balance, it is stated by those in authority would be easy.

Following is the letter from the Midland Commercial club:

We note in the El Paso Herald that Roswell is agitating the construction of another railroad to run in an easterly direction. The citizens of Midland and adjoining sections are also agitating the building of a road from New Mexico to make connection at Midland with the Texas & Pacific, and probably extend it in a southwesterly direction to the town of Kerville, which is the terminus of S. A. & P. railroad, and thus give a direct connection to the gulf.

"Can we not inspect your people in, at least investigating the construction of a road from Roswell to Midland. Our people are prepared to come across with a bonus of at least \$100,000. This will be a much shorter line than the one you are contemplating to Rotan, Texas, and will give you a trunk line connection to the north. It will free you from the control of the Santa Fe and furnish good connections to the north and west.

Dynamite Discovered Ahead Of President's Train.

San Francisco, Oct. 16.—A report received here today by officials of the Southern Pacific Railway Company from a section foreman of the road at Naples, Cal., gave details of the discovery of thirty six sticks of dynamite under the Cairtan viaduct, twenty miles north of Santa Barbara, several hours before President Taft's special train passed over the bridge enroute Los Angeles this morning. The dynamite was found after the watchman engaged in a revolver battle with two men, who escaped.

The dynamite was discovered at 2 o'clock this morning. The President's train passed over the bridge at 5:51 o'clock. The night watchman saw two men on the bridge shortly before 2 o'clock. They were at the opposite end of the 1,000 foot span and ran when ordered to halt. The watchman hurried across the bridge firing several shots, which were returned.

After the pair had escaped the watchman returned to the bridge and began an investigation. Near the center of the span, lodged on one of the supports of the viaduct, he found the thirty six sticks of dynamite with a ten foot fuse attached to one of the sticks. He left the find untouched, going immediately to Santa Barbara and notifying the officials. Sheriff Wines of Santa Barbara county went immediately to the bridge with several deputies and removed the dynamite. A general search for the men is on.—F. W. Record.
