Mysterious Cabin.

J. R. Smith Locates Deterred Cabin Built in Angle of Arroyo Sheltered From Sight.

While riding down the river some time ago in search of some cattle, J. R. Smith, who has a ranch up the Pecos about 30 miles found an old cabin which is believed to have belonged to a band of desperadoes many years ago.

The cabin stands in a lonely canyon, it being impossible to come nearer than three miles of it with a wagon, as it is built a half on a ledge, and the one approach from the river.

Its discovery was brought about in the following manner: During a time of high water, Mr. Smith while riding down the side of the river, discovered a part of the canyon, which was so low that he has never seen it before. He followed it up and down the bank

came to the cabin, built in an angle of the arroyo and sheltered from sight in every direction. While from its appearance it shows that it has not been used for a number of years, still it being in a sheltered position has helped it in withstanding the elements.

On every side from the top of the canyon, the country is so rough that it is almost impossible to get over it afoot, let alone riding over a horseback or in a wagon.

Although Mr. Smith may not be the first discoverer of the place, He believes that there has been very few before him that have seen the place besides the real owners, as he has lived in the country along time and has never heard of the place.

The Bandits Kill Officers.

Leader of Bandits Also Killed and Another Wounded.—Two Escaped.

Deming, N. M., Nov. 20.—A battle that has been daily expected between the various posses headed by the Deming officers and the three outlaws, has taken place at the Cross T ranch about 85 miles northwest of Eagle. The posse headed by sheriff Dwight E. Stephens, assisted by deputies Hall, Smithers and Simpson, came upon the outlaws from behind a ridge of hills. A fierce fight followed in which officers Al Sanchez and Tom Hall were instantly killed, another wounded, the wounded outlaw with the third member of their gang, escaped.

The bodies of the dead officers and the outlaw were taken to Eagle by sheriff Stephens and Simpson. The bodies of the dead men were brought to Deming for burial today.

Deputy Simpson, accompanied by another posse are now hot on the trail of the two escaping outlaws. It is thought they will be overtaken before long, as one of them appeared to be mortally wounded.
