April 22—Annual Meeting Southwestern New Mexico Cattle Growers Association, at Deming.

Tularosa is to have a high school building.

An appropriation of \$50,000 is asked for free text books.

A carload of beans was shipped from Maxwell to Kansas City.

Coal has been discovered in the Black range in Sierra county.

The House passed Nestor Montoya's bill abolishing the \$3 road tax.

The Legislature reported unfavorably on Mr. Welsh's bill that the state care for illegitimate children.

Mr. Sulzer's bill would permit the peddling of produce from the farm by farmers without license.

The House passed Speaker Romero's three-cent railroad fare bill on final reading by a vote of 27 to 8.

Turumcari will donate six acres of land to Chicago parties, who will establish a sisal factory in that town.

A hay barn on the old Exell place, belonging to Dr. Quirey, south of Carlsbad, was burned to the ground.

Mr. Sena's bill for the extermination of prairie dogs will be favorably received upon its enactment into law.

Fifteen and three-tenths inches of snow fell in Santa Fe in the month of January, according to the weather bureau summary.

The body of John Shubert was found on Zine avenue in Deming, death being due to a dose of poison which he had taken.

A prize of \$29 gold was awarded by the Portales Utilities Company to C. L. Sanders as having the neatest and cleanest farm in the valley.

Governor McDonald has appointed the following notaries public: David E. Shaw, Raton; Geo. Edwards, Hatch; Bernard Jacobson, Belen.

Contractor Samuel de Deming secured contracts for the erection of two new buildings in the business section, which will cost approximately \$30,000.

At Santa Fe, suit for \$10,000 damages has been brought against the El Paso & Southwestern railroad for the alleged injury to the health of R. M. Kenman.

Governor McDonald has appointed the following notaries public: John W. Van Dyne, French; Benito S. San doval, Anton Chico; Charles P. Downs, Carrizozo.

Carrizozo now has a great white wire, electric current from the Wildcat Leasing property at White Oaks supplying current to electric lights all over town.

The "car haul" bill, one of the measures demanded by the railroad employees of New Mexico, was introduced by Representative Skidmore of Colfax county.

That J. P. S. Mengeti of Santa Fe better known as "Jack" Mengeti, is one of the eight candidates for U. S. marshal in Porto Rico is stated in the Porto Rico Progress.

A joint resolution proposing the reduction of the salaries of district judges from \$1,500 to \$1,000 a year was introduced in the House by Mr. Bryant of Roosevelt county.

A damage suit for \$20,000 was filed by Joe Griff, an Austrian, through his attorney, Elmer E. Studley, of Raton, against the St. Louis, Rocky Mountain and Pacific Company.

The Holt Senate bill specifying the amounts of the bonds to be furnished by the treasurers of the various state institutions requires a bond of \$75,000 from the treasurer of the State College.

Deposits in savings banks increased from \$78,421,152 to \$92,900,002 during the year.

Elfezo Baca, who shot and killed Celestino Otero at El Paso, Tex., asked for his own indictment. The accused claims the shooting one of self-defense. Baca was released under \$7,500 bond on a writ of habeas corpus.

The House passed the House substitute for Senate Bill No. 2, extending to 1915 the 1914 assessments as finally fixed by the State Board of Equalization on corporate property, bank property and livestock.

James Goutchey of Santa Fe, for years in the federal building, has been appointed to deputy U. S. marshal. His appointment follows closely the naming of William Rose chief deputy in the U. S. marshal's office.

The bill providing for the appointment of women to places on the boards of all state institutions, introduced by Nestor Montoya, by request, was recommended for passage, as amended, by the public institutions committee of the House. The amendment excludes the Military Institute at Roswell.

Adjutant General Harry T. Herring at Santa Fe, received a telegram from Captain A. W. Brock of Company I, National guard at Deming, that six ten rifles and 300 cartridges, stolen from the army at Silver City, had been dug up near Mimbrres, Luna county, close to the border.

Practically all hope has been abandoned of finding, dead or alive, Captain M. Cooney of Socorro county who has not been seen or heard of since last October when he started into the Mogollon mountains on a prospecting trip.

Jim Baker, constable, had a close call at Carlsbad, being shot at close range by a Mexican named Eurica Carasca, alias Cascarets, whom he arrested. Later, Carasca pleaded guilty and was sentenced to eighteen months in the penitentiary.

The Nestor Montoya libel law, which has the indorsement of the executive committee of the State Press Association, was reported to the House by the judiciary committee of that body with the recommendation that it be passed. The committee re-

Committee Will Investigate College. Santa Fe.—Representative F. O. Blood of Las Vegas introduced House Bill No. 158, providing for the appointment of a legislative committee of five members, of whom three shall be from the House and two from the Senate, for the investigation of the affairs of the State College of Agriculture and the failed First State bank of Las Cruces and the relation of the traveling auditor and other state officers thereto, and a probe into the entire situation, which was unanimously passed.

Ask \$250,000 Industrial School. Santa Fe.—Several thousand residents of San Miguel county have signed petitions to the Legislature asking for the establishment of a state industrial school at Las Vegas, maintained by the funds from the sale of Las Vegas community grant lands. The funds now amount to nearly \$250,000.

Rancher Buried Alive in Well. Taos.—That Abelino Vargas, a prominent rancher living near Ojo Caliente, Taos county, met an awful death by being buried alive. He was digging a well and had gone down fifteen or twenty feet in an effort to strike water, when the earth caved in and entombed him.

Kills Neighbor in Duel; Surrenders. Carlsbad.—Felix Miller and Charles M. Arcey met on the prairie on horseback near here and, following a quarrel over school lands, opened fire at each other, Arcey being killed.

Let Each County Fix Salaries. Santa Fe.—J. M. Palmer, Republican representative from San Juan county, has declared himself in favor of a salary bill that will allow the legislative delegation from each county to fix the salaries of county officers in that county. This is a plan for settling the question of county salaries that now is receiving considerable attention in the House, from Republican as well as Democratic members.

Eats Hearty Meal; Dies at 105. Albuquerque.—After eating a hearty supper, Santos Sanchez, 105 years old, sat down in a chair by the fire in his home. A few minutes later one of the family approached him and found him dead. His wife, many years younger, died six months ago. Sanchez had not been ill for a decade.

A Woman Preacher. Santa Fe.—Because of the illness of Rev. B. Z. McCollough, his wife was called into the pulpit at the vesper services at the First Presbyterian church. Although the call was unexpected she delivered an excellent though brief talk to the congregation.

Credit Teachers for Exposition. Albuquerque.—The State Board of Education, by resolution, determined to accept properly certified records of six days' attendance at either of the expositions this year in lieu of institute work this summer, as required from all teachers. It is recommended though not mandatory, that the attendance be at the San Francisco exposition in August during the meeting of the National Education Association.

To Buy State Supplies in State. Santa Fe.—A bill requiring the purchase of goods and supplies for public institutions and public offices, and of materials for use in public works from dealers within the state, was introduced in the house by Nestor Montoya, of Bernalillo county. The bill also provides that in public works eight hours shall constitute a full day's labor. Violation of its provisions is made a misdemeanor.

ESCHEAT FUND TO STATE FORGOTTEN LAW PUTS BANKERS IN TIGHT PLACE

New Mexico Men Face Terms of Six Months to Seven Years for Failure to Pay State Dead Accounts.

Albuquerque.—The discovery of a forgotten section of the session laws of 1899 has brought to light the embarrassing situation for the bankers of the state that all of them who have taken any active part in the management of banking affairs since that date are liable for imprisonment for from six months to seven years.

There is one law relating to the publication of lists of accounts against which no check has been drawn in three years and the taking of proceedings for escheat to the state of such funds. No money has ever been paid in under this law. State Treasurer Marron declared, although it is believed that the forty national banks and fifty-one state banks of the state have a total of not less than \$100,000 of such dead accounts.

The law came to light through the office of the attorney general in Santa Fe, which issued a letter warning all district attorneys of the state to take steps to secure an early publication of lists of such accounts by all banks in their districts and to further proceed in escheat to secure the money for the general school fund of the state.

As attorney for Albuquerque bank, Treasurer Marron declared he had advised the bank that it did not apply to national organizations, but that in his opinion it could be enforced against state banks.

The provision of the law makes it possible to imprison each director and managing director of any bank for six months for each year in which the publication has not been made. Since the law has been in effect fourteen years and there have been dead accounts in some of the banks for all that time, some bankers are liable to seven years' imprisonment.
