DOINGS AND HAPPENINGS THAT MARK THE PROGRESS OF THE AGE.

### ABOUT THE WAR

It is stated that Gen. Natera has deserted Villa and taken his 8,000 men to Carranza.

American vessel Leelanaw of New York sunk by German submarine off the Orkney islands.

Casualties in the British army and navy have reached a total of 239,295, according to a printed statement issued by Premier Asquith.

An official statement issued at Rome says: "The island of Polagosa, important on account of its strategic situation, has been occupied by the Italian forces."

Two German submarines, which appeared suddenly in the midst of a fishing fleet off the north coast of Scotland, destroyed all of the nine vessels, by shell fire.

The Belgian steamship Princess Marie Jose, of 1,523 tons gross burden, was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine. Twenty-one members of crew of twenty-five were saved.

The Frankfurter Zeitung's Vienna correspondent says the Austro-German forces have captured 131,250 Russian prisoners since July 14, besides forty-one cannon, 141 machine guns and an enormous quantity of military supplies.

A Petrograd official bulletin says: "In the Black Sea Sunday our torpedo boats operating in the coal region destroyed forty sailing ships laden with coal. They also destroyed a new coal shaft and a suspension bridge."

There are signs that momentous events are occurring around Warsaw. If the evacuation of the Polish capital already has not begun, it is believed in many quarters that the withdrawal of the Russians is not far off. The probable evacuation not only of Warsaw but of the whole Polish salient is indicated in dispatches from Petrograd.

### WESTERN

The attendance at the Panama-Pacific Exposition to date totals more than 9,000,000.

Eight men were killed and fifteen badly burned in a gas explosion at one of the entrances of the Modern-west mine at Christopher, Ill.

The body of Eddie Bartlett, well-known as a fighter in the bare-knuckle days, has been identified among the victims of the steamship Eastland.

After investigating the attack upon Leo M. Frank at the Milledgeville state prison farm, the Georgia prison commission gave a statement exonerating Warden Smith.

At Chicago a coroner's jury returned a verdict, placing the blame for the loss of hundreds of lives by the capsizing of the steamer Eastland in the Chicago river on six men.

The Rev. W. H. McCart has been acquitted in Superior Court at Covington, Ga., on the charge of having murdered Monroe Smith, a neighbor, 15 years ago.

At Phoenix, Ariz., Judge McAllister granted an appeal to the five Mexicans condemned to hang, and their cases will come up at the September term of the Supreme Court.

José Ignacio Rodriguez, 77, was killed by the collapse of the rear wall of his home, an adobe house which had been weakened by persistent heavy rains, at Albuquerque, N. T.

Three children of W. R. Grimes, a farmer near Temple, Tex., were beaten to death with a hammer. Grimes and his wife also were beaten into unconsciousness and Mrs. Grimes is not expected to live.

Eight hundred Seventh Day Adventists, camped at Dayworth, between Forth Worth and Dallas, expect the "second coming of Christ" and the "marshaling of the heavenly army in the skies" as soon as the allies capture Constantinople.

### WASHINGTON

Russia's winter cereal crops promise heavy increases this year.

Goods consigned to American citizens valued at \$153,000,000 are lying on the docks at Rotterdam, Holland, held up by the British order in council, forbidding all commerce with Germany or Austria.

American marines were landed at Port of Prince, Haiti, to protect the lives and property of Americans and other foreigners.

After six days of fighting the Carranzas have captured Pachuca, the Carranza agency announced. The column Villa sent to aid Zapata was completely defeated, it was added.

The Italian contraband list and royal decree governing Italy's attitude toward neutral shipping reached the state department the list showing close conformity to that of the British government.

The American embassy force at Petrograd is to be increased by three new attaches to meet the press of business caused by the war and the manifold interests which the United States has assumed for the belligerents.

The United States government expects Germany to pay for the American steamer Leelanaw, sunk by a German submarine off the Orkney islands, and the state department transmitted instructions to Ambassador

### FOREGOING

A consular officer at Bari, Italy, has accounted five months belonging to the Dominican monastery, who were arrested in June, charged with spying.

Capt. Eugene Delt and the crew of the American steamer Leelanaw, which was sunk by a German submarine, arrived at Aberdeen, Scotland.

It was learned on high authority at London that the British authorities have arrested a German subject who had in his possession a forged American passport which the arrested man admits is not genuine.

Sir James Augustus Henry Murray editor of the Oxford English Dictionary and author of numerous works on historical subjects, died in London. He was born in 1837 and was created a knight in 1908.

Telegraphing from Amsterdam the London Morning Post correspondent says: "The City of Antwerp was fined 250,000 francs (\$50,000), for popular demonstration held there on the Belgian fête day."

The war has become and is likely to continue for some time, a contest of endurance, Premier Asquith told the house of commons while making a general review in moving the adjournment of Parliament until Sept. 14.

The Rev. Dr. Charles W. Gordon, famous as an author and minister, chaplain of the Forty-third battalion of Cameron Highlanders, writes in the Toronto Globe, an intensely loyal English newspaper, that Great Britain "faces the specter of defeat in this war."

General Oscar, governor of Port au Prince, Haiti, and a supporter of President Guillaume, caused to be executed at the time of the outbreak of the revolutionary movement in that city all the political prisoners in the hands of the government to the number of about 160 men.

At Port Au Prince a mob of infuriated Haitians removed Vilbrun Guillaume, president of Haiti, from the French legation, where he took refuge and shot him to death in front of the building. This act of violence followed immediately the burial of 160 political prisoners who were massacred in prison.

At Berlin the Overseas News agency gave out the following: Negotiations between Germany and Russia for the exchange of incapacitated prisoners of war have finally been successful after many fruitless efforts. This is due largely to the work of James W. Gerard, the American ambassador at Berlin."

### GENERAL

Alton B. Parker, Democratic candidate for president in 1904, who was on his way from Los Angeles to San Francisco, said in an interview before his departure, that President Wilson would be renominated.

Mabel Coleman, 8, of Scottsbluff, Neb., was drowned, and five others narrowly escaped death, eighteen miles west of Torrington, Wyo., when an automobile turned turtle in ten feet of water in an irrigation ditch.

At Ossining, N. Y., Police Lieutenant Charles Becker, twice convicted of instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal, gambler, was electrocuted at Sing Sing prison at 5:45 o'clock Friday morning. Becker died proclaiming to the last his innocence of the crime charged and his devotion to his wife, who labored until the last hope was gone to obtain a commutation of the sentence to life imprisonment.

"If you survey your family tree through twenty-four generations and admit the wedge-shaped result gained thereby, you have 4,000,000 grandmothers and grandfathers," was the statement made by Joseph F. Smith, Jr., son of the president of the Mormon church, at a meeting of the Genealogical society of Utah, which met in convention at San Francisco.

Fred C. Dideham, 20, and Leo J. Stanley, 23, both of St. Louis, were drowned in the Meramee river in sight of hundreds of picnickers when their canoe capsized.

"Justice Ford did the only thing he could do. The evidence was conclusive. If I had any doubt as to the guilt of Becker I should pardon him." This was Governor Whitman's comment on the refusal of Justice Ford to grant Charles Becker a new trial.

Mrs. R. Leavy of Walsenburg was injured when the automobile which her husband was driving rolled into a ditch two miles from Fountain.

Treasury Department officials at Washington have fixed Jan. 1 next as the date of the official opening of the new postoffice and federal building in Denver.

The flow from the Cripple Creek deep drainage tunnel now exceeds 11,000 gallons a minute. The daily recession as shown in the Elkton property is six inches.

Miss Lucile Woodard of Sterling has been appointed assistant county agriculturist for Logan county. Her work is to organize clubs of women to study home economics.

The lessees on the Jason property on Poverty flats, north of Leadville, have opened up a body of high-grade iron and silver, of which they are shipping quite a tonnage.

With the entire right side of his body scalded as a result of a fall into a vat of boiling water in Denver, Charles Weible, 36 years old, an employe of a packing company, is lying at the point of death at St. Luke's hospital.

Two new county agents have been appointed by the executive committee of the State Board of Agriculture. They are Hall Flint, to represent Lincoln and Kit Carson counties, and George R. Smith, to represent Adams county.

E. E. McLaughlin, chairman of the Industrial Commission of Colorado, issued a statement in which he warned employers that all insurance companies who attempt to cut the rates fixed by the commission are doing so against the law.

There is a revival of mining activity in the Fulford section of Eagle county, according to the latest reports from that district. A diamond drill hole is to be put down on the Calientes holdings, where good lead and zinc indications have been unearthed.

After the questions of the court had been transmitted to him by means of the sign language, Edgar Fru Watson, deaf highwayman, pleaded guilty to four different robberies in the West Side Court in Denver. He was known as the Candy Kid No. 2, and imitated David Tyler's series of robberies.

Under difficulties and hazards that forced a score of younger folk to turn back, S. Stutsman, 75, and his wife, 74, who came to Colorado recently to climb Pike's Peak on a golden wedding anniversary trip, accomplished the purpose of their visit Thursday morning in an unprecedented ascent of the noted peak.

Michael P. Fox, Jr., eldest son of Mrs. Elizabeth Fox, who died in Denver July 8, has filed suit in the District Court at Boulder to obtain what he claims is his rightful share in his mother's \$50,000 estate. The defendant is David Evans, Denver, whom he charges with having induced his mother to disinherit him.

Recommendations that leniency be shown Jacob H. Sherry have been made to the State Board of Pardons by Walter M. Morgan, the district attorney who prosecuted Sherry for the murder of John Zabranski, an aged Brighton jeweler, and by Charles McCall, formerly district judge who presided at the man's trial.

The Denver tramway and gas companies paid into the city treasury \$639,437.39, the full amount due for taxes on the property of these corporations for 1912, 1913 and 1914, under the compromise effected between them and the city. Of this amount the tramway company paid \$378,956.33 and the gas company, \$261,371.05.

A check, drawn on a fictitious bank in Oklahoma for \$49 and passed at a clothing store in Denver, resulted in a verdict of guilty for George A. Burnett of Kansas City in the West Side Criminal Court. When Burnett was arrested several weeks ago he had in his possession 200 unsigned checks, aggregating \$17,000, drawn against the same fictitious bank.

Ralph W. Bradley, a Fort Collins young man, who eloped last fall with an heiress of Fort Collins, is under arrest in Edmonton, Alberta, for killing Roy Smith, whom Bradley charges with alienating his wife's affections. Bradley fired five shots into Smith, surrendered and confessed.

Governor Carlson addressed a large gathering at the United Presbyterian Church in Fort Collins, speaking on the workmen's compensation act and the prohibition law and the relation between the two.

While stealing a ride on a freight train to Sterling Peter Finorff, a Bulgarian laborer, was held up by two men who boarded the train ten miles out of Denver. They secured about \$375, most of which was in endorsed certificates of deposit drawn on a Bulgarian bank in Chicago.
