Secretary of State Lucero has licensed 4,763 automobiles.

Joe and Jack Turner of Lordsburg shipped 1,500 angora goats to Texas.

A pear weighing 1 1/2 pounds has been on exhibition in a store at Portales.

The postoffice at Tularosa and Roy have been raised from fourth class to third class.

Henry Pollard will ship twenty-five carloads of apples from two ranches near Espanola.

A Colorado company will sow wheat on seven sections of land north of Clovis.

Despondent because of ill health, Otis Rogers of Grande committed suicide by shooting.

Felix Apodaca of Escobosa was killed by his wagon overturning in which he was riding.

Felix Miller was acquitted of the charge of murder of Acroy before the District Court at Carlsbad.

Good progress is being made on the construction of the state highway between Portales and Clovis.

A Denver man has been awarded the contract for erecting the new hotel at Ojo Caliente Springs.

H. A. Coomer, general manager of the New Mexico Central railway, has resigned and will go to Oklahoma.

Six jitney bus lines have filed their runs with the Albuquerque city clerk and given their bonds for \$2,000 each.

The state treasurer has invested \$65,000 of the permanent school fund in bonds of the city of Haton.

Oscar Beadle of Dexter sold two cars of Jonathan apples for \$1,129 net, prices running from \$1.20 to \$1.75 per box.

Fourteen companies filed incorporation papers during September, the combined capitalization being \$2,150,000.

The Magdalena Ice, Light, Power Water and Laundry Company has been incorporated with a capitalization of \$75,000.

After a chase of fifteen hours with a pack of bear hounds, Mrs. M. G. Chase killed a large cinnamon bear near Cimarron.

Dr. J. W. Waffensmith exhibited in Santa Fe a tarantula captured at Espanola, which measured six inches "from tip to tip."

An alfalfa meal mill is being planned at Dexter. It is reported over 500 cars of alfalfa are stored around that place.

A report from Tyrone says that Mrs. Lucius C. Hightower was killed by her husband, who fled but was trailed and captured.

Mrs. Jesse Beatty was killed by lightning while sitting in her home near Grady. Her little daughter, nearby, was uninjured.

The grand jury at Santa Rosa indicted Hugh and Noah Daniels on a charge of murdering J. A. Tatum aged 63, last May, and Damasio Aragon, charged with killing his wife Mrs. Manuella Baca de Aragon.

The entire output of the Hondale cannery, 10,000 cases of tomatoes was sold to an El Paso company for something like \$10,000.

Quay county District Court at Tucuman will consider 35 civil cases and 50 criminal cases, three of the latter being for perjury.

At the meeting of the first synod of the Presbyterian church in New Mexico held at Roswell, a committee of five was appointed to reorganize the work in the state. E. E. Nathes, Melissa Park, is chairman of the committee.

H. A. Jastro, former president of the company, secured the Albuquerque Traction Company on his bid of \$20,000. It is said a new company will be formed to take over the property and spend \$50,000 on improvements.

The Fort Sumner saloon case, which was to have been appealed by attorneys representing the proprietors of the four saloons in that town, has been settled by the attorneys withdrawing their appeal and accepting the decision of Judge Leahy by which the election continuing the saloons was set aside.

Adolph P. Hill has been appointed assistant secretary of state by Secretary Lucero. Mr. Hill has been acting in the capacity of assistant for several months.

Business men of Roswell deprecate recent newspaper reports of the hailstorm in the Pecos valley as being overdrawn and not representing the actual damage done.

Charles Youngblood of Trinchera "ass, Colfax county, bagged four bears in three weeks. Mr. Youngblood is 87 years old but gets around in accordance with his name.

Millie Serkorksky, a waitress, killed herself by shooting in Albuquerque. She left a note giving the name of a man responsible.

The Wilson Land and Grain Company of New York has bought 19,000 acres of land near Mills. The tract will be developed as a wheat producer.

Walter Collins fell from a freight train in the Belen yards and was taken to the hospital at Albuquerque, where he died later. Collins was a switchman and his home was in Belen.

**HOUSE JOURNAL WRONG**

BOND ATTORNEYS FIND SERIOUS DEFECT IN RECORD OF LEGISLATURE.

May Invalidate Bonds for Armories at Carlsbad and Deming.

Sixty-one of the 101 bills supposed by passed by the last Legislature, and which have become effective, were not legally passed by the House according to the journal of that body.

This astounding discovery has been made as a result of the question raised in regard to the legal passage of the bills authorizing the issuance of bonds for the construction of National Guard armories at Carlsbad and Deming. The bond attorneys found that the journal of the House failed to show that the bills were read publicly in full, after having been enrolled and engrossed, as provided by Section 20 of Article 4 of the state constitution.

An exhaustive examination of the House journal, which has just been completed by Assistant Attorney General Harry S. Clancy, discloses the fact that 59 additional bills are in the same unfortunate position as the two armory bills—the House journal fails to show that the constitutional requirement was complied with.

The attorney general's office will have proceedings instituted in the Supreme Court by a taxpayer to enjoin the state treasurer from proceeding with the sale of the Carlsbad and Deming armory bonds, on the ground that the bills authorizing them were not legally passed. In this way the question of the legality of all of the 61 acts will be brought before the court, and a decision obtained. It is probable that the injunction suit will be filed soon.

**SURPLUS, \$30,000.**  
State Land Commissioner's Receipts in Excess of Needs.

Santa Fe—State Land Commissioner Robert P. Ervin has turned into the State Treasury, for distribution to the various land grant funds nearly \$30,000 of the money allowed him for the operation of his office during the last year. The exact amount was \$29,992.18. For the expenses of his office the State Land Commissioner is allowed 20 per cent of the total revenue derived from state land sales and leases. During the year ending September 30, this 20 per cent amounted to \$68,985.84. The cost of operating the office during was \$38,994.30, and the balance was the amount returned to the state treasurer for distribution to the various funds. Approximately half of it goes into the common school fund.

**Levy Certified to Counties.**  
Santa Fe—The state auditor has certified the levies to the commissioners of the various counties for the fourth fiscal year. He asks for a 3 mill levy for state purposes, under the Bursum law; for 15 of a mill to raise \$22,000 for the charitable institutions; also 30 of a mill for interest and sinking fund, a special levy of 3 1/2 mills for cattle indemnity and a 3 mill sheep sanitary fund levy.

**Show Manager Killed.**  
Melrose, N. M.—Fred L. Lewis, owner and manager of the Transcontinental Comedy Company, was instantly killed here by the explosion of a carbide tank which was used in producing light for the moving picture show, one of the features of the amusement enterprise. He was right over the tank when it exploded, and a portion of his head was blown away.

**State S. S. Association Elects.**  
Roswell—The State Sunday School Association elected the following officers: R. W. H. Cristman, At-Large, president; D. A. Porterfield, Albuquerque, vice president; Miss Mahel A. Smith, Otto, secretary; H. S. Lithgow, Albuquerque, treasurer.

**1,000 Men Working on Roads.**  
Santa Fe—Largely as a result of the recent sale of the state highway bonds, a total of over 1,000 men are to be employed on New Mexico roads under the state engineer in the coming year. There are today 250 men and 150 teams at work in eighteen camps, and additional work now being established rapidly. Most of the new work now being inaugurated is in the southeastern part of the state.

**Mrs. Tipton Publicity Agent.**  
Santa Fe—State Land Commissioner Robert P. Ervin has appointed Mrs. William H. Tipton of Santa Fe to take charge of the collection and publication of statistics under the law authorizing the use of 3 per cent of the revenue derived from the sale and lease of state lands for publicity purposes.

**State Tax Valuation.**  
Santa Fe—The total full valuation of property in New Mexico, as finally fixed by the State Tax Commission at its recent meeting is \$307,967,965.14. This represents a net increase over the total full valuation returned by the assessors—\$283,276,624.41—of \$24,691,340.73. It is over \$22,000,000 more than the total full valuation of 1914. To obtain this increase the commission made general increases aggregating \$18,811,810.66, and placed on the rolls omitted property to the value of \$1,324,199.68.

**Daily Trains Discontinued.**  
Santa Fe—A new time card has been announced for the New Mexico Santa Fe and Torrance, a distance of 116 miles, taking effect October 3. Central railway running between The innovation of tri-weekly, instead of daily, trains, is the most striking feature of the new card. The trains will leave Santa Fe Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and arrive here on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.
