Joint Resolution.

RESOLVED, By the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled:

"First—That the people of the island of Cuba are, and of right ought to be, free and independent, and that the government of the United States hereby recognizes the republic of Cuba as the true and lawful government of that island.

"Second—That it is the duty of the United States to demand, and the government of the United States does hereby demand that the government of Spain at once relinquish its authority and government over the island of Cuba and withdraw its land and naval forces from Cuba and Cuban waters.

"Third—That the president of the United States be, and he is hereby directed and empowered, to use the entire land and naval forces of the United States and to call into the actual service of the United States the militia of the several states to such extent as may be necessary to carry these resolutions into effect.

"Fourth—That the United States hereby disclaims any disposition or intention to exercise sovereignty, jurisdiction or control over the said island, except for the pacification thereof, and asserts its determination if that is accomplished to leave the government and control of the island to its people."
