**Another Blast.**  
Collector of Customs Behan and Line Riders Hathaway and Chatham last evening succeeded in making a good capture of smuggled mescal as well as the smuggler. The officers had been given a quiet tip, and last night were on the watch between here and the line when suddenly their man came in view with two burro loads of mescal, amounting to forty-two gallons. The Mexican was ordered to stop which he did, and the officers then brought him here and he occupies a cell in the city jail. The Mexican's whole outfit, consisting of three burros, one saddle, two pack saddles, blankets, etc., gun and pistol, were brought in and will be sold at auction, together with the mescal.  
These officers are making it warm for smugglers in this vicinity and are deserving of great credit for their recent captures.  
"Organize or get left" seems to be the impelling spirit of the hour. A farmer's paper says: "Combination among nations, concentration among corporations. That's the watchword of the hour. With industrial and national expansion this policy will grow in strength. It means that the farmer organize in self-protection or he will 'get left.' The time was never so auspicious for a great movement to advance the cause of agriculture. We don't mean by organizing a political party, but by perfection a combination among farmers that will compel all parties to do them justice, besides helping farmers to buy together and sell together and to aid them socially and educationally." But, as the same paper says, it is easy enough to start such a movement, but it takes brains to make a go of it. It is to be feared that no means can be devised free the farmer from the evil of having to sell as well as buy at other people's prices.  
The farmers are thinking about the proposed annexation of the Philippines and of Cuba. The tobacco raisers of the Connecticut valley easily see that these islands, once in the circuit of the United States tariffs, will ruin their home industry. They can't help Porto Rico, and that will furnish an injurious competition, but they will surely be heard from against the further competition of the countries we don't need to take. Then there are the sugar planters to be considered. Hawaii's annexation has been as much of a blow as they can consent to. This concern of agriculture in the colonial policy is very forcibly set forth by the New England Homestead. Protection is to be left standing for everybody else apparently, but it is knocked out completely by colonialism at the only point it affords any advantage to farmers.  
The Meat Market of Overlook Brothers was broken into last night and the cash register robbed of between eight and ten dollars. An entrance was made through a window on the south side of the building by cutting the wire screen. There is no clew to the perpetrators.  
No further news has been received concerning the dead man found on the river, except that he was found by the officers and buried. No marks of violence was found as, the body was in an advanced stage of decomposition.  
Voters should bear in mind that registration closes 20 days before election, and that those not registered cannot vote. Make it a point to go to your justice of the peace and register without delay.  
The university of Arizona will open September 19th. From the number of applicants now registered there is reason to believe there will be a much larger registration than before.  
Bismarck should put up some good man for supervisor this year and support him regardless of politics, as the business end of the county should have at least a little say when it comes to "cinching" the people for expenses.  
Charles Stevens, a prominent capitalist of St. Johnsbury, Vermont, accompanied by Harvey Varnum, a prominent engineer and contractor of Boston, arrived in Bisbee yesterday and will remain a few days. Messrs. Varnum and Stevens are here overlooking the field and may become interested in properties here.  
The Sutton, the candy man, is paying our city a business visit.  
SENATOR FORAKER is probably correct in his assertion that the senate would ratify a treaty annexing all the Philippine islands, says the Globe-Democrat. Annexation sentiment, as shown by the expression of the newspapers and of public men, has been growing rapidly in the past month, and it will probably be much stronger when, next December or January, the treaty comes before the senate. Very little opposition is shown now to the acquisition of all the Philippines and that which does appear is usually accompanied by the acknowledgment that it is useless. The American commissioners will all stand out for the possession of the whole group, and their position will naturally prevail. We are masters of the situation in the islands, and this circumstance will give us the ascendancy in the commission. Spain's only hope that she can retain any of the islands lies in the expectation that the continental European nations may interpose to save her, but most of her newspapers and public men begin to see that this chance is very shadowy. There will not be much of a fight in the commission against the American determination to take the Philippine archipelago.

The session will last from three to four weeks. W. W. Weed, court stenographer, and City Attorney Charles Bowman, who will serve in the capacity of deputy clerk, will accompany the judge. They will return to Tucson in time to be on hand for the beginning of district court here at its next term, October 10.—Tucson Star.  
It is now thought that the reception to be tendered to the Rough Riders will have to be postponed for some time. A number of the boys will visit their homes in the east before returning here and it will be some time before they all arrive here. A few will probably arrive this week and the balance will return one by one. The plan at present is to await the return of them all, and then give them a banquet and reception to be concluded with a grand ball.
