An outsider watching the Arizona campaign would imagine that Colonel Brodie's sole object in joining the Rough Riders was to secure a record to aid his political aspirations. The Colonel's political friends are placing him before the country in a very unenviable light. -El Paso Times.

Col. Wilson has been the head and front of the fight against Murphy-McCordism from first to last. His record on this line is an open book, and no crowd of goldies can make any man believe any twaddle about his private talks being contrary to his official declarations. -Courier.

At the Brodie grand rally in Phoenix the republican managers added a magic lantern show and skirt dance to the attractions. At Tucson they also had the magic-lantern show but substituted a quartette of singers for the skirt dance. From published reports of the Tucson gathering the singing quartette had three encores with great attendant enthusiasm. What kind of a sideshow will they give us in Bisbee?

Did Col. Brodie do any more or as much in the service of his country in Cuba, than did hundreds of other Arizona boys? Did he not owe it to his country? Being educated at West Point at the expense of the government did he do any more than repay his country? He is not entitled to near the honor that the other Rough Riders of Arizona are, who without any military training offered themselves as targets for Spanish guns in behalf of their country. Yet none of these boys were offered the nomination for delegate to congress. Had they, there is not one of them would have accepted it on a gold platform.

The Atlanta Constitution thinks that the chances of democratic control of the next house of representatives seem to be growing as the date for the congressional election grows near. The republican leaders have sounded an alarm which is evidently something more than a bluff for the purpose of raising campaign funds, and a poll of the different states made by impartial correspondents of the Washington Post, shows that the administration party has come to fear defeat.

The election of Col. Brodie, if it were possible, means simply an endorsement of the republican administration, both national and territorial. Those voters of the territory who endorse the monetary policy of the McKinley-Hanna administration should certainly vote for Col. Brodie. The silver question is now the issue as fully as it was two years ago, but in this territory it is plainly necessary for the republicans to ignore this question so far as possible. Certainly the press and speakers of that party are making every effort in that direction, but it cannot be possible that they can succeed in deceiving a single intelligent voter of Arizona upon a question so vitally important and especially so to this territory. With the republicans in the mind centers of the east it is very different. They plainly demand that the silver issue be distinctly brought forward and positively decided against silver and its advocates. They reiterate the fact of the adoption of the gold standard plank by the national convention of their party and call for their "pound of flesh." The territorial administration want to show McKinley that they have earned their appointments by securing success at the polls for a candidate standing squarely on a platform endorsing the republican national platform and the administration that the gold-bugs elected it. The McKinley-Hanna administration wish to be able to point to republican success in Arizona as evidence that even in the home of silver its cause is dead. It cannot be that the voters of Cochise county will by their votes contribute to this result.

DEMOCRATIC COUNTY PLATFORM.

The Democratic party of Cochise county heartily joins the democracy of the entire country and all friends of the free and unlimited coinage of silver, in reaffirming allegiance to the principles set forth in the platform adopted by the Democratic National Convention of 1896.

We also endorse the platform adopted by the Democratic Territorial Convention, September 16th 1898.

We approve and endorse the policy of our present representative in congress, the Hon. Marcus A. Smith, whose ability has gained for him an eminence in the councils of the nation never attained by any other delegate from any territory.

We pledge our support to the present standard bearer of the Arizona Democracy, and believing that only a silver man can truly represent the sentiments of the people of this territory, we urge all believers in the double monetary standard to unite in electing to congress that fearless and unchanging advocate of silver and the peoples rights, Colonel J. F. Wilson.

We feel inexpressible gratitude to the brave soldiers and sailors who have won such unparalleled victories for our flag, for freedom and for civilization, and point with especial pride to the record of the volunteers from Arizona.

We are opposed to the removal of any territorial public institution, or the division of any county by act of the territorial legislature.

We believe in the strictest economy in the conduct of our county government and in the employment of every honorable means to reduce the rate of taxation now imposed on the people.

TERRITORIAL DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM.

The Democratic party of Arizona reaffirms its allegiance to the principles set forth in the national Democratic platform adopted at Chicago at the national convention in June, 1896.

It demands that the mints of the United States be opened to the coinage of both gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, without asking or awaiting the consent of any other nation.

To enforce the gold standard through the world is impossible. The present condition is intolerable. The Democratic party believes that the issue thus presented is the most important in American politics.

The mission of the United States is to teach the world the sublime lesson of human liberty and self-government, and the further lesson that its people have the courage and ability to discharge every responsibility which the fortunes of war may have thrust upon their country. Wherever the flag waves it shall be the symbol of freedom guarantee the inalienable rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. We send a greeting to our army and navy for their heroic valor displayed on land and sea.

The Democratic party of Arizona hereby approves the recent war with Spain and justly shares in the glory of its results. We favor the independence of Cuba and the retention by this government of the Spanish West Indian possessions and the control by this government of other Spanish territory now occupied by American forces.

It is the duty of the government to make homes for its citizens. Arizona has a large amount of arable lands,

sufficient in extent for millions of population, which can be reduced to cultivation through the agency of the government, by building storage reservoirs and preserving the storm flood waters for irrigation purposes.

Therefore, inasmuch as we secure none of the benefits from the river and harbor appropriations, we think it only just that a liberal appropriation should be made by the general government for this purpose.

The setting aside of one-quarter of the territorial area of Arizona as a timber reserve works a great hardship upon the territory at large, without equivalent benefits. The forests can be preserved under proper legislation without excluding them absolutely from mining, grazing and agricultural pursuits.

We arraign the Republican administration because, regardless of the rights of the people, they have increased our territorial debt over \$300,000 by the funding of illegal and spurious claims against the territory, and the enforcement of the prison contract before its final adjudication by the courts, which have largely increased the debt of the territory.

We favor the repeal of the laws creating the boards of equalization, loan commission, board of control and immigration commissioners, and also the law granting the governor the power to remove officials at pleasure, and the passage of such laws as will lodge the powers exercised by these boards in commissions elected by the people.

We arraign the Republican officeholders of Arizona for the defeat of the home rule bill which pending statehood, is necessary to our advancement as a territory, because it gives the people, the taxpayers and citizens the right to choose their own executive and administrative officials.

The Democracy of Arizona are now, and always have been, earnestly in favor of statehood, and we hope it will not be long before the congress of the United States strikes from the wrists of Arizona the manacles of territorial servitude.

We pledge the Democratic party its representative in congress and its members of the legislature to the carrying out of these measures of remedial reform, and ask all good citizens to unite with us in securing a victory for the free coinage of silver, statehood, and legislation that will bring the government of Arizona closer to the people at large.
