WHERE IS THE SPIRIT OF '76?

The president in his Boston speech said:
 "Could we, after freeing the Philippines from the domination of Spain, have left them without government and without power to protect life and property or to perform the international obligations essential to an independent state? Could we have left them in a state of anarchy and justified ourselves in our own consciences or before the tribunal of mankind?"
 To which Editor Post, of the Public, adds:
 "France gave us some substantial help when we freed ourselves from Great Britain. Suppose that after the treaty was signed she had said: 'Now we have freed you from the domination of Great Britain, but we cannot leave you without government and without power to protect life and property or to perform the international obligations essential to an independent state. We will just annex you, or take you under a sort of military protectorate until you learn to govern yourselves. Thereby we shall be justified in our consciences and before the tribunal of mankind.' Imagine what response the patriots of '76 would have made to these pious platitudes! Where is the spirit of '76 when American patriots applaud such utterances?"

ADMIRAL DEWEY is not neither can he be induced to accept the nomination for the presidency. This question was settled by the Examiner who sent a special message to Manila to ask the great sea captain if he would accept the democratic nomination to which Dewey gave this decisive reply: "I would not accept the nomination for the Presidency of the United States. I have no desire for any political office. I am not fitted for it, neither in education or training. The navy is one profession, politics is another. I am too old to learn a new profession. I have no political aspirations, and my health would never stand the strain. I have been approached by politicians repeatedly, in one way and another, but I have refused absolutely to consider any proposition whatever. This is final."

BOUETTE, of Maine, chairman of the house committee on naval affairs, has pocketed the bill creating the office of admiral, for Dewey. Bouette has been guilty of not a few unpatriotic actions or possibly utterly selfish acts, and this seems one of them, either meanly selfish and personal or unpatriotic. Maine has a couple of men in congress that need to be left at home next time they have evidently dropped behind in the march of national progress.

Put the bullion tax law to sleep with the circuit court bill.

The Bowie county bill got it where the chicken got the axe.

Why not put a tax on the output of alfalfa fields of the Salt River valley.

Now will you be good, Sister Wilcox? Your little babe, Bowie has been put to rest in the arms of Cocaine and Graham counties, and there it will remain.

It might be well now for Councilman Warner to introduce a bill, into that body to divide Pinal county. He might do it by request, just to even up with our former friend Wright. How would that strike you Doc?

There are some fellows down in Phoenix, who have both hands out behind them, but they are liable to find out when it comes to matters of their own county, that they have not the friends they might have had before.

The passing of the bullion tax law by the 20th Legislature, means a stinging blow at the industry that has made Arizona what it is today. At present new companies are being organized and formed for opening up undeveloped prospects and when they discover that as soon as they begin to take out ore or bullion in return for the vast amount of capital invested, their revenue is taxed, while the farmers, merchants, etc., who have been making their living and profits from the workings of the company, are not taxed a cent. Were the mining companies of Arizona unite together and refuse to pay such a tax, and close their works down, we are afraid the agricultural and lumber interests of the territory would not support our vast population.

THE ORN received yesterday a circular letter and blank petition, with the request that it be circulated for signatures praying the Territorial Legislature for the passage of a law placing a tax on the output of the mines of the territory. The petition was sent from Flagstaff, a lumber producing section, where they have mining resources. If the petition asking that this tax be placed upon the bullion output of our mines also included in its prayer the productions of the lumber mills of northeastern Arizona and the growing crops of the agricultural sections, there might be some little excuse for asking for the enactment of such a law, but where the justice of legislation against our mining industry comes in we fail to see. A bullion tax is an income tax, pure and simple, and the highest tribunal in the land, (the supreme court of the United States) has decided that an income tax is unconstitutional and cannot be levied or collected; hence the petition would be of no effect and has gone to the waste basket.

Rathbone Sisters.

Mrs. Lydia A. Monroe, of Riverside, California, who was in Bisbee last week, organized the Lily Temple No. 3. Mrs. Monroe has had considerable experience in organizing lodges of the Rathbone Sisters as her work here fully demonstrated. The Verdict Set Aside.

The case of Robt. Coleman vs. State of Texas, a motion for a new trial, was called before District Judge Bliss this morning. Coleman was convicted for alleged false swearing in the rendition of his property for taxes. The motion for a new trial contained all the usual counts, but there was one unusual count, to wit: that the jury had, in deliberating upon the case, discussed the fact that the defendant had not testified in his own behalf. This was the count taken up first. Six members of the jury found the verdict came into court and testified that they had discussed and heard discussed the fact that the defendant did not go on the stand in his own behalf. The court set the verdict aside and granted a new trial. The point is important; if a jury discusses the failure of a defendant to testify it invalidates the verdict.—Sherman Register.

Items of Interest Culled from our Exchanges.

The pen is mightier than the sword, but when it comes to making up an official report of a court of inquiry the whitewash brush may be used, which is considered mightier than either.

One of the biggest ranch and cattle deals ever made in Texas is reported from Tom Green county. The ranch owned jointly by J. B. Wilson and E. B. Conner, consisting of 400,000 acres, together with 22,000 head of cattle, has been sold to Calvin Sugg, of Suggden, I. T. The price paid was \$750,000. Mr. Sugg gave a check for the full amount, drawing on a St. Louis bank.—Ex.

Arrangements for the greatest sporting event ever held in Arizona, are now almost complete. It is to be an international tug of war contest to be given in this city on March 15, 16 and 17, for the honor of the races of the contestants and the championship of the territory. The tournament will be held at O'Neill's hall. There will be three prizes. The first will be \$100 and ten per cent of the gate receipts, the second \$75 and the third \$50. This money is now ready to be deposited in the National Bank of Arizona.—Phoenix Herald.

One can scarcely walk through Phoenix at the present time without getting tangled up in the network of water pipes that pervade the whole place. The mains and lateral lines are strewn over the whole town upon the surface of the ground. However, ditches are being made as rapidly as possible, in which the pipes will be buried. The company expect to be furnishing water to the Morenci people by March 1. The piping from Eagle river to the hills, a half mile south of town, is about completed, only a few hundred feet remaining to be put in place.—Solomville Bulletin.

Following closely on the heels of the big strike in the Crowned King mine, comes one in the Silver Trail mine, one of the Sundance group on the Hassayampa, near the Senator mine. For some reason or other the news of this strike has been kept concealed from the public, probably awaiting further development to ascertain how extensive it may prove. It has, however, leaked out, and from reports, which seem to be authentic, the strike rivals that made in the Crowned King a few weeks ago. It was made at a depth of 220 feet, and the ore body, which is four feet wide, is said to be fabulously rich, although no values have been reported. The ore was first encountered about four days ago and it has continued both in size and quantity ever since. The Silver Trail mine has produced some very rich ore near the surface and has always been considered a good property. It lies about midway between the Howard mine which produced such rich ore near the surface, and the Senator, which has also produced thousands upon thousands of dollars worth of the shining metal. There are a score or two of other properties within a distance of a few miles, which are being worked and which are now and have in the past been good gold producers.—Journal-Miner.
