Beats All Records.

The chances are that the following beats all records:

"Billy Bohne and Geo. Klomp were offered \$20,000 for a twenty-days' lease on their Mint mine. The offer was refused."

This paragraph is from *Mineral World*, published at Kingman, Ariz., and has reference to the Mint mine, owned by the two parties mentioned in which a very rich strike of silver and gold was lately made, an account of which was published in this paper on August 12, the news of it having been communicated to us by Mr. A. M. MacDuffie of Chloride, Ariz. The strike, to which reference is made, was in the 500-foot tunnel in which a 12 to 18 inch vein of ore was opened up that goes from 7 to 8 ounces in gold and 1500 ounces silver to the ton. With such values and such a vein it is not difficult to understand that the owners refused \$20,000 for a 20 days' lease of it.—Min. Review.

The compulsory school law will be enforced in Bisbee this year, in consequence of which the attendance of children at school may be expected to be greatly augmented. Parents and guardians have been duly notified, and should be governed accordingly. This law has been twice published in the *ORB* and no excuse will be entertained, except sickness. The law was made in the interests of the children and they must receive its benefits. The school will open Monday, September 11, and the parents and guardians of children of school age should see to it that they are prompt in attendance when the bell announces the hour of 9, so that each child may be assigned to the room and class for which it is fitted to enter. If you will do your part the teachers will do theirs, and another year will witness such an improvement in the youth of Bisbee that it will be noticeable to the most careless and unobserving.

Women are practically barred out of government service in the departments at Washington. There is no concerted action among the heads of the departments and chiefs of bureaus to exclude women from appointment, but when one tries to place a woman in the head of the office, it is invariably done for a man. Civil Service Commissioner Barlow says the commission is a list of women stenographers and typewriters eligible for appointment, but could not get the appointing officer to take them. "There are many little reasons," said Barlow, "which seem to influence the heads of the government offices to prefer men. The principal one, perhaps, is that while women may do as well during regular working hours, if there is a rush and it is necessary to work over hours work can be crowded on men better than on women."

A. Barnaby returned home yesterday, from Sonora, where he has been on mining business. Mr. Barnaby says their property recently purchased, in which E. S. Adam, N. W. Chase, Otto Van Kanel, Dennis Curren and Major Hargrave are interested, is looking well, and that they are extracting and sacking quantities of high-grade gold ore, preparatory for shipment. They have plenty of water within two miles of the mine, which is packed on burros. The new owners of the mine are elated over their purchase and confidently expect to realize handsomely from it in the near future.

Since '81, there has not been a single year bringing such prospects for cattlemen as the present year. The rains have been general and reports from all sections of the territory are that water is abundant and feed was never more plentiful. The price of cattle is excellent, and the demand in western markets is urgent. With all these advantages, in his favor what more could the western stockman ask? This truly is prosperity.

He claims that he and his mining companions, Henry Rogers, Peter Meehan, Carl Hinton and Thomas Meloney, were driven out of life in the country, and that they intend to lay their grievances before the highest federal authorities at Washington, to-day.

Schnetlin says: "The persecution of us, as well as scores of other American miners began many a year ago, and has grown in intensity, so that now an American's life is in constant danger in the Atlin country. We were forced to abandon our claims and were allowed twenty-four hours to leave."
