### Advantages of the University.

Tucson, A. T., Nov. 14, 1899. Editor Bisbee Orb—Dear Sir: It seems to me that the wonderful opportunities open to our young people for education are not half appreciated by the mining regions of the Territory, and I wish to offer a few remarks in regard to this institution and its advantages as I have found them by personal experience upon coming to the university, as I have, at the age of thirty-one, and after spending thirteen years in the roughest parts of the west.

Having been deprived of an education in my early youth, I felt much embarrassed upon entering, but I have found that a student here, whatever his previous education has been, will have no cause to feel embarrassed among the members of the faculty and the students. It is not only a place for study, but an opportunity for social training, and gives abundant opportunity for pleasant social recreation.

Classes are conducted in all the elementary branches, and there are higher classes in chemistry, assaying and other branches, especially related to mining, so that I think it a grand opportunity for any young man with an ambition to better his condition in life—an opportunity which no man ought to neglect. Tuition is free, and abundant dormitory accommodations are provided by the university, and the rate for board is surprisingly low—about fifteen dollars per month.
