Articles of Incorporation
 O. T. B. E. -
Santa Paula Gravity Oil Company.

Know all men by these presents that we Edward Dunham, G. W. Witherell, H. A. Bingham, J. J. Lobergan, John Rebban, Frank J. Hart, William Wincup, Neill E. Bailey, all of the county of Los Angeles, State of California, hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of becoming incorporated under the provisions of Chapter 2, Title 12 of the Revised Statutes of the Territory of Arizona, and do hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation:

ARTICLE I.
 The name of this corporation shall be "Santa Paula Gravity Oil Company."

ARTICLE II.
 The names of the incorporators of this corporation are Edward Dunham, G. W. Witherell, H. A. Bingham, J. J. Lobergan, John Rebban, Frank J. Hart, William Wincup, Neill E. Bailey, a list of Los Angeles county, California.

ARTICLE III.
 The principal place of business of this corporation shall be in the county of Cochise and Territory of Arizona.

ARTICLE IV.
 The general nature of the business proposed to be transacted by this corporation is and shall be the buying, selling, leasing, owning, holding, possessing and operating of mines, mining claims, oil lands, oil wells, real estate and personal property, the construction and operation of mills and works for refining crude petroleum and manufacturing petroleum products, and the purchase and sale of petroleum and petroleum products; to acquire, own, hold, sell and deal in personal property and merchandise, and generally own, hold, acquire and deal in any property, and to do or transact anything necessary for the carrying out and engaging in any of said foregoing lines of business.

ARTICLE V.
 The amount of capital stock authorized by said corporation is and shall be Three Hundred Thousand (\$300,000) Dollars, to be divided into three hundred thousand (300,000) shares of the value of One Dollar (\$1.00) per share, and that the time when and conditions upon which it is to be paid are as follows: One hundred thousand (\$100,000) shares in cash or property upon issuance, and shall thereafter be non-assessable for any purpose whatever.

ARTICLE VI.
 The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be the date of the filing of these Articles of Incorporation for record in the office of the County Recorder of Cochise county, Arizona Territory, and the termination thereof shall be twenty-five (25) years thereafter, unless extended or renewed pursuant to the laws of Arizona before the termination thereof.

ARTICLE VII.
 The affairs of this corporation are to be conducted by a board of (3) Directors, to be elected annually on the first Monday of April of each year; provided, however, that as soon as practicable after the filing of these articles of incorporation the stockholders shall elect a board of directors, who shall hold office till the first Monday in April, 1901, or until their successors are elected and qualified.

Each stockholder of this corporation, in all elections for directors and other officers, and on the consideration of all questions at stockholders' meetings, shall have the right to vote in person or by proxy the number of shares owned by him, as given on the books of the company, each share of stock being entitled to one vote.

The officers of the said corporation shall be a President and Vice President, who shall be directors of said corporation; a General Manager, and a Secretary and Treasurer, and such subordinate officers and assistants as may be deemed necessary.

All officers shall be elected by the board of directors after the annual election of said directors, and shall hold office at the will and pleasure of said directors.

Vacancies in the board of Directors shall be filled as may be provided in the by-laws.

ARTICLE VIII.
 The highest amount of indebtedness or liability for which the corporation is at any time to subject itself is the sum of Five thousand (\$5,000) Dollars.

ARTICLE IX.
 The private property of the stockholders of this corporation shall be exempt from all corporate debts, and the stockholders of this corporation are hereby exonerated from all liability for any debt of said corporation.

ARTICLE X.
 This corporation shall have an office for the transaction of its business in the state of California, at the city of Los Angeles, California, and said board of directors may meet and transact the business of said corporation at said city, and the annual and other meetings of the stockholders and the elections may be held thereat.

ARTICLE XI.
 Section 1. The board of directors shall have the power to make, adopt and amend by-laws for the government of the affairs of the corporation.
 Section 2. The board of directors shall have the power to borrow money, execute corporate notes or bonds of the corporation, and to secure the payment of the same by mortgage on property of the corporation, or in any other manner designated by said by-laws, not exceeding, however, said total indebtedness of \$5,000, as limited in Article VIII hereof.

ARTICLE XII.
 The corporate stock of this corporation shall be forever non-assessable, and each certificate thereof shall state upon its face the number of shares represented thereby, and that the same is forever non-assessable.

ARTICLE XIII.
 These articles of incorporation may be amended at any annual meeting of the stockholders, or at any special meeting of the stockholders called for that purpose, by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the stock of the corporation then issued, in favor of a amendment, or by a vote of each amendment signed by the holders of two-thirds (2/3) of the subscribed capital stock and recorded and published as required by law.
