REQUISITION DENIED.

Texas' Ineffectual Reaching After Secretary Wood.

The Phoenix Republican of the 3rd instant sheds the following additional light on the seemingly interminable Cobre Grande matter:

Sheriff Boone of El Paso, Texas, arrived in town yesterday morning with a requisition for the extradition of J. Henry Wood, secretary of the Cobre Grande company, who is said to have been indicted at El Paso for perjury alleged to have been committed in an affidavit made in the litigation now going on at El Paso concerning a large quantity of copper matte shipped from the Cobre Grande mine to the smelter at El Paso, while the company was in possession of the property. The indictment was found against Mr. Wood almost two weeks ago, and it was under the indictment that Mr. Wood was twice arrested a week ago, once at Nogales and once at Benson. The last time he was released on telegraphic instructions from El Paso and the indictment was believed to be ended. All this, however, was described at considerable length in the Republican at that time.

The arrival, therefore, of the El Paso sheriff with a requisition for Mr. Wood was something of a surprise. The sheriff presented his papers to Governor Murphy early yesterday morning. The governor, after going over them carefully, declined to honor the requisition, and he wrote at some length to Governor Sayers of Texas telling him why. He also explained to Sheriff Boone that the charge against Mr. Wood was only an incident in a civil suit and said that the criminal machinery should not be set in motion to give either side an advantage over the other.

It will be remembered that the affidavit by Mr. Wood upon which the charge of perjury is based related to certain transactions between him and W. C. Geene in Sonora. The statements themselves were unimportant, so far as any bearing they might have on any litigation in El Paso was concerned. The most surprising thing about the incident is that an El Paso grand jury should have undertaken to consider matters which occurred in a foreign country.

Superior Work.

W. R. Thom has just completed the handsomest and most expensive monument yet erected in the Bisbee cemetery. It is to the memory of the late Mrs. W. C. Creene. The material is granite and the design and lettering is equal, if not superior, to anything yet brought into Arizona. Mr. Thom is an artist in his way, and the REVIEW is glad to see home talent employed to the exclusion of those who garner but do not sow.

WILL REBUILD.

E. G. Norton Will Reconstruct With Brick.

E. G. Norton, who suffered the loss of his cottage Sunday afternoon, states that he will not erect a frame building in its stead, but will construct a two-story brick in the near future. Such a building would be expensive should the material have to be shipped in over rail, but Mr. Norton says a fine quality of brick is being manufactured at Naco and that he can build with this material equally as cheap as with lumber and that henceforth the Norton buildings will be of modern architecture and not subject to the fury of the flame as heretofore.
