The delay in the construction of the new opera house is caused by the contractors not being able to obtain building brick. Work on the Bisbee Heights tennis courts has been delayed on account of the late snow storm. Mr. Hamner, who has charge, will commence work again on Monday, and the courts will be finished as soon as possible. Nets, rackets and balls have been ordered and when they arrive some exciting contests may be looked for.

The new Schenectady locomotive arrived from the factory Monday evening and made a trial run on Wednesday. This engine is known as No. 8 and is similar to the seven spot with addition of 5000 lbs. more on the drivers. The engine will be used on the main line and will greatly facilitate the handling of freight traffic which has been increasing very rapidly of late.


Geo. Bernard, owner of the Iron Mountain group of mines, situated about nine miles from Bisbee, came into town last Thursday. He is making arrangements to sink a 300-foot shaft and run a 500-foot cross-cut. Assays from one of the prospects show 35 per cent copper and \$300 in gold at the grass roots, and the surface indications all around point to a valuable mineral deposit and George thinks he has it. He says the Iron Mountain group of mines are not for sale.

W. C. Greene accompanied J. E. Hardy, a mining man, from New York to Cananea and back to Bisbee. Mr. Hardy is highly pleased with the Greene property, and says it is without doubt another Verde. "We are now running a tunnel through a vein on the El Provenca claim and we have gone in 76 feet and still in a body of high-grade copper ore. The native copper is so thick," said Mr. Hardy, "that we find it very difficult to blast and have to chip out the metal. We now have one of our 360-ton furnaces running and expect to have two more going in a week. We are delayed in running our plant to its fullest capacity because of the non-arrival of some parts of machinery that we must have before we can run two of our large blowers. We expect to have every thing going in full blast within a few weeks.

The new county officers began their duties last Tuesday morning. A. V. Lewis stepped into the office made vacant by Scott White. Frank Hare turned over a new leaf in the Recorder's office and was ready for his second term. M. D. Scribner is behind the counter in the Treasurer's office and his duties are familiar to him having fulfilled the position with credit before. The Probate office for the next two years will be in the hands of C. R. Bostwick and Walter T. Fife will place the valuation on all assessable property. The prosecution of criminals and the scrutiny of county demands will remain in the hands of District Attorney Ed Land, and the supervision of our public schools will be looked after by E. A. Nichols. The new supervisors will be Thos. R. York, P. J. Delehanty and Geo. B. Reay. In the legislature our interests will be looked after by C. C. Warner, H. M. Woods, Mike Gray and Steve Roemer. The new precinct officers are Geo. B. Wileox and S. K. Williams Justice of the Peace, Amell Kunz and Michael Doyle, constables.
