A train was made up at Albuquerque, the mail, baggage, etc. transferred and the Pullman coaches coupled on at Luna, arriving here at 4 o'clock yesterday morning. All trains are running on time.

RECOGNIZED HEADQUARTERS FOR ALL TOURISTS.

The trial of Ebenezer Jenkins, charged with being a nuisance, occupied the attention of Judge Juris Prosdouce, who had turned the Presbyterian church into a temporary courtroom, Tuesday night. The trial lasted two hours and a half and was conducted in a most decorous and parliamentary manner. The proceeds from the entertainment netted the Men's Club, under whose auspices it was given, the neat sum of \$15.

Monday afternoon a telegram was received here conveying the sad intelligence that Hugh Warren, an old resident of Flagstaff, but who was then employed in building a turntable for the Atlantic & Pacific at Albuquerque, had been instantly killed by a derrick falling upon him. The accident occurred at 3:15 p. m. Monday. Warren was foreman of the stone-masons who were constructing the turntable. The insecure fastenings of the derrick mast was the cause of the tragedy. In falling the big mast struck Warren squarely in the back, crushing in his left side and causing an instant and perhaps painless death. Warren was well and favorably known along the line of the Atlantic & Pacific, by whom he had been employed for a number of years, but always claimed Flagstaff as his home. The only known relatives of the deceased are supposed to be living in Boston.

The overland passenger train, No. 1, with Engineer William Dase at the throttle, which left here at 3:35 Monday, had an encounter with train robbers when a few miles this side of Peach Springs. After forcing the watchman in the rock cut to flag the train, they compelled Fireman Bart to dismount and uncouple the mail and express car from the train. Express Messenger Summers and his helper Randall each jumped from opposite side doors of the express car and ran back toward the train. Summers came suddenly upon one of the robbers standing on the steps of the rear

platform of the express car and immediately opened fire with his .45 caliber Colt's revolver on the bandit. The first shot passed through the robber's body, just above the heart, and another entered his left eye, coming out at the back of the head. The robber rolled off onto the ground. While this was going on the other bandits had succeeded in getting the mail and express cars uncoupled and conveyed with all speed to Nelson siding, where the mail car was gone through and eight registered packages consigned to Uncle Sam's care appropriated. The two robbers then made their escape. Deputy Sheriff Fletcher Fairchild was on No. 2 coming up from Kingman with Tom Sims, the Mexican cook, wanted here as a witness in a larceny case, and ordering his prisoner to proceed for Flagstaff, got off at Peach Springs and started on the trail of the robbers. Sheriff Cameron left here Tuesday morning for the scene. The dead bandit has been identified as a cowboy formerly in the employ of the Arizona Cattle Company here. It is impossible for the bandits to escape, owing to the topography of the country adjacent to Peach Springs, and their speedy arrest is expected.
