The dam now being constructed at Seligman by the Santa Fe Company will be about 600 feet in length and 68 feet high, and it will take six months to build it.

The new municipal building is nearing completion and when done will be one of the most imposing structures in Flagstaff. The entire building of

brick and stone, is constructed of material of home production. Sykes Bros. have the contract for the two steel cages and cells, and are making them here by their own hands.

Contractor J. C. Milligan is kept busy supplying brick for the structures that are springing up all over town. His yard at the sands one quarry is in a state of constant eruption from the ever burning kilns.

The special excursions to Flagstaff from Phoenix by the S. F. P. & P. railroad, will be run every two weeks and one fare for the round trip will be charged, with tickets good for return sixty days from date.

There is more work going on in and around Flagstaff than is usual at this season of the year, and yet money is scarce, but the fact of there being considerable work doing is a good omen of better times near at hand.

The Grand Canyon Hotel is undergoing extensive repairs in front and rear. Two carpenters have been kept busy the past two weeks. Manager Oscar LeBaron evidently has in mind the comfort of his guests as the first consideration.

Word reached here last week that the mining interests in the forest reserve would not be molested. Congress has exempted the Grand Canyon forest from any liabilities as to its mineral. This is good news to all parties having mining properties in the Grand Canyon.
