The Stock of Ex-Presidents.

The country has never had a very large stock of ex-Presidents living at any one time. The death of General Grant leaves but two men outside the present administration who have filled the Presidential chair, and the largest number was in Lincoln's time, when Buchanan, Pierce, Fillmore, Tyler and Van Buren made the number of ex-Presidents up to five. There were four survivors when John Quincy Adams took his seat, and the same number when Polk came into office, but in each case the number was reduced to two before the end of a four year's term.

When General Grant himself became President his surviving predecessors were Johnson, Pierce and Fillmore, but before the end of his eight years in office they were all dead, so that he was the sole living ex-President when Rutherford B. Hayes succeeded him in 1877. The widows of four ex-Presidents are now living, and have been pensioned by act of Congress, each receiving \$5,000 and it is of course probable that the same courtesy will be extended to Mrs. Grant.—Waterbury American.

When Stone-wall Jackson Did Not

Rebuke.

I never knew him to let profanity pass without a rebuke but once. The incident was reported to me by the chief actor in it, Maj. John A. Harman, who was Jackson's chief quartermaster, and a man of extraordinary qualifications. It happened at Edward's Ferry, on the Potomac, when our army was crossing into Maryland in the Antietam campaign. Maj. Gen. D. H. Hill's Division was crossing, when Jackson rode up and found the ford completely blocked with Hill's wagon-train. He spoke to Hill (who was his brother-in-law, they having married sisters) for allowing such confusion. General Hill replied that he was not a quartermaster, or something that implied it was no part of his business to get tangled wagons out of the river.

Jackson instantly put Hill in arrest, and turning to Maj. Harman ordered him to clear the ford. Harman dashed in among the wagoners, kicking mules, and apparently inextricable mass of wagons, and, in the voice of a steator, poured out a volume of oaths that would have excited the admiration of the most scientific mule-driver. The effect was electrical. The drivers were frightened and swore as best they could but far below the Major's standard. The mules caught the inspiration from a chorus of familiar words, and all at once made a break for the Maryland shore, and in five minutes the ford was cleared. Jackson witnessed and heard it all. Harman rode back to him, expecting a lecture, and, touching his hat, said: "The ford is clear, General! There is only one language that will make mules understand on a hot day, that they must get out of the water." The General, smiling, said: "Thank you, Major," and dashed into the water at the head of his staff.

Here are some of the pithy sayings of the Rev. Samuel Jones,

of Georgia, who is conducting an extraordinary revival at Nashville, Tennessee: "What is culture worth if it's nothin' but whitewash on a rascal?" "Fd rather be in heaven learnin' my A B C's than in hell readin' Greek." Some preachers are so elegant that they speak of hell as the 'burnt district,' but this sort of dignity is the starch of a shroud." Heaven is on the dead level with every good man, and every good man will be provided for in some way." "Will honest men starve? God will feed an honest man if he has to put the angels on half rations." "Be honest and pay your debts. There's too many men in the church boardin' with their wives." "Pull up your doubts by the roots and you'll find a seed at the bottom, and that seed is sin." "A lie is always on the down grade, but the truth you have to hitch an engine to."—Chicago Journal.

The soldiers' monument at Atlanta is to have statues of Grant, Lee, Johnson and Sherman around the base of the column. Near the top will be two soldiers, the blue and the gray, clasping hands, and above the globe that crowns the summit will be the Goddess of Liberty. The structure will be 180 feet in height and will cost \$100,000.
