SAN CARLOS DAM

The Senate Favors Its Construction.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 26.—The Indian appropriation bill to-day received from the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs the first attention that has been given to it by that body. The sub-committee consisting of Senators Thurston, Platt of Connecticut, Stewart, Jones of Arkansas and Pettigrew, took up the bill and after examining many of the provisions, decided to consider the petition of the Pima Indians of Arizona for improved facilities for securing water for irrigation. Hydrographer F. H. Newell of the Geological Survey, and others, were heard as to the utility of the proposed dam for storage reservoirs on the Gila river at San Carlos. It was stated that these Indians had been deprived of their water supply by the construction of an irrigation system by white men, and that, whereas they had been self-supporting up to that time, they were now on the verge of starvation. It was estimated that the proposed dam will cost about \$1,000,000. The committee is apparently disposed to make some provision for the unfortunate Indians.

Prof. A. G. McAllister has resigned as principal of the Florence public school and accepted a similar position in Congress at a higher salary. The school board met on Monday and appointed Prof. W. W. Wilson to fill the vacancy. Our school will not suffer by the change, as Prof. Wilson is an educator with years of experience. His recent examination, whereby he received a first-grade territorial certificate, proves him to be thoroughly capable and up to date. Let us all stand by him, man, woman and child.

The performance at the Court-house on Christmas eve for the benefit of the Catholic Church was largely attended and greatly enjoyed, and proved a financial as well as artistic success. The eight beautiful shepherdesses were neatly attired and performed their parts gracefully. Juan Aguilar, John Miches and Adolfo Montano proved to be natural born actors, while the little boys dressed as angels where too cute for anything.


