A FATAL ACCIDENT.

Six Year Old Child of Antonio Spezia Falls Down Abandoned Shaft and is Instantly Killed.

On Friday afternoon last, while playing in the vicinity of the old Blue shaft, the six year old child of Antonio Spezia fell a distance of more than a hundred feet down the shaft and was instantly killed.

The little fellow was playing with his companions around the old shaft. Through curiosity some of the board's covering the mouth of the shaft had been removed and while at play the little boy, Felix Spezia, lost his footing and tumbled through the opening. He sustained several fractures of the skull and death was instantaneous. The funeral occurred Sunday morning in Fraternal ceremony.

As soon as the alarm was given the Morenci Fire Department arrived on the scene and Mr. Palmer was lowered into the shaft on a hose line and rescued the lifeless body.
