Sends Telegram to Tucson Chamber of Commerce Upon Completion of E. P. & S. W.

### FRANCHISE IS GIVEN FOR ELECTRIC LINE.

GLOBE, Nov. 21.—At 5:50 Tuesday evening the board of supervisors passed the resolution granting to one Nathan L. Amster, of Boston, Mass., a right of way for an electric street railway from the town of Globe to and through the town of Miami to Live Oak.

The session of the board began at 10 o'clock in the morning. The supervisors' office was crowded during the day with attorneys, citizens and others interested in the passage of the franchise.

Before passing the franchise a resolution was passed by the board defining the method of handling the initiative and referendum in the matter should it be submitted.

### LIBEL SUIT FOLLOWS CHARGE OF ASSAULT.

SOLOMONVILLE, Nov. 25.—The hearing of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Broshars, charged with assault with a deadly weapon on the person of J. M. Foster, came up before Justice Yett at Solomonville. At the conclusion of the testimony in the case of Mr. Broshars he was held to await the action of the grand jury in the sum of \$1,000, whereupon Mrs. Broshars waived examination and was placed under the same bond.

### SAFFORD WILL SOON HAVE "DRY" ELECTION.

SAFFORD, Nov. 25.—A petition is being circulated and numerously signed asking the board of supervisors to order an election in the incorporated town of Safford on the wet and dry question.

Quite a number have signed the petition who are known to have voted at the previous election to dry the town, under the belief that to close the saloons would stop the sale of liquor. But disgusted with the systematic boot legging that has been carried on they are convinced that a well regulated saloon is better than the condition that has prevailed ever since the town went dry.

### IRONWORKER FELL 70 FEET TO DEATH.

DOUGLAS, Nev. 25.—While working on a girder of the boiler house of the C. & A. mine here yesterday Sherman Elszler, an ironworker, fell a distance of seventy feet to a flat car on the railroad track below. He was killed instantly. There is no reason given for the accident as the man had a reputation of being a very careful workman.
