

SEEKS EXTRADITION OF SLAYERS OF RANCHMAN

Governor McDonald Demands That Mexican Authorities Return Fugitives.

Through representations made to him by Sheriff Herbert J. McGrath, of Grant county, N. M., Governor W. C. McDonald has made formal demand on the governor of the state of Chihuahua, Mexico, for the return to New Mexico, of Albert Powell and Wilbur Field, two deserting negro troopers from the Ninth United States cavalry, now doing border patrol duty with station at Hachita.

Powell and Field are wanted for the crime of murder, having slain George McFarland an employee of the U-Bar ranch at Campbell Wells, this county, on March 3, this year. The slayers fled to Mexico following the crime, being arrested by Mexican troops at Ascension, Mexico. They are now reported serving in Villa's army, having been pressed into service following their arrest.

The murder of McFarland was an atrocious one and the sheriff's office is determined to bring the slayers to justice. It is believed the fugitives will be brought to the line and turned over to the Grant county officers.
