**ROOSEVELT CLUB IS ORGANIZED IN TUCSON**

TUCSON—A Roosevelt club was organized in Tucson last night at a meeting held for that purpose at the chamber of commerce. There was a large attendance of Roosevelt supporters, and much enthusiasm was shown.  
The purpose of the club as outlined in the speeches was to aid in securing the nomination of Colonel Roosevelt by the Republican convention in Chicago next month. A dozen parties present asked for petitions for circulation among the people of the city and county. Regardless of their politics members will be invited from those who believe that Colonel Roosevelt should be the president during the crisis which now faces the country. These petitions will be generally circulated and copies will be left at the drug stores and other places in the city.  
Speeches were made by Walter Wakefield, Colin Cameron, Ben Henry, Mrs. Ben Daniels, John Stout, J. C. Gatti and George H. Smalley.  
Mr. Gatti, who is from Greenlee county, stated that a Roosevelt club will be organized in Clifton this week, and similar clubs are being organized throughout the state.  
Walter Wakefield presided at the meeting and George H. Smalley was chosen secretary.  
The next meeting of the club will be Thursday night at the chamber of commerce, when the committees will report and further plans will be formulated.

price of silver makes a decided increase in the production at many of the mining camps, and reports are being received that shipments are stimulated and further exploration greatly encouraged.  
Silver remained very low after the war and was the very last to respond to the conditions that have boosted the market for all of the other metals. With the increase in silver comes greater returns, greater wages, etc., and more material property, which will be reached over the entire state.  
1915 was a record production in silver in Arizona, the output increasing from 4,377,994 ounces in 1914 to about 5,458,000 ounces in 1915, or over 24 per cent, having a total value of about \$2,731,000. With an increase in the value of silver of almost 40 per cent, it is readily seen what this means to the total state's production. The greater part of the silver comes from the copper ores, although the increased shipments of silver lead ores have also contributed to the increase. The silver production from zinc ores and lead zinc ores is not great, but siliceous ores in Cochise county supply a material percentage. The Commonwealth mine at Pearce and the Bunker Hill mine at Tombstone contribute the greater part of the Cochise county silver.  
Every increased price in metals adds hundreds of thousands of dollars to Arizona's importance.

**NO EXCUSE**

**METAL PRODUCTION SHOWS REMARKABLE INCREASE**

The low price of silver no longer hangs over the market affording an excuse for the delay in the restoration of the high state of prosperity.
