



**INTEREST ON COUNTY HIGHWAY BONDS MUST GO TO GENERAL FUND**

Phoenix, April 22—Interest on county highway bonds deposited in a bank by a county treasurer cannot be applied to the highway fund but must be placed to the credit of the county's general fund, according to a ruling made today by W. J. Galbraith, attorney general.

The question was submitted to Galbraith by officials of Pima county Highway bonds of that county amounting to \$1,500,000 were sold and the funds were placed with the county treasurer who deposited them in a bank where interest amounting to \$70,000 subsequently accrued on the money. The county highway commission claimed this money for highway improvement.
