

HON. CARL HAYDEN MAKES PLEA FOR FEDERAL JUDGE

Washington, D. C., July 13—The House Committee on the Judiciary has favorably reported the Ashurst bill providing for an additional Federal Judge for the District of Arizona. When the bill was under consideration by the Judiciary Committee Congressman Carl Hayden of Arizona and James R. Dunsenath of Tucson, who was Mr. Hayden's opponent on the Republican ticket at the last election, appeared and urged its passage. The following extract from the hearings contains the substance of their remarks:

Mr. Hayden. You will note, Mr. Chairman, that this bill passed the Senate on May 2, 1921, being, I believe, the fourth time it has passed that body in this identical form. The same bill was so favorably reported to the House by the Committee on the Judiciary in the last Congress. The measure provides for the appointment of an additional judge for the district of Arizona, and does not authorize the appointment of an additional United States marshal or district attorney or an additional clerk. Their work will be done by deputies.

There is present this morning Mr. James R. Dunsenath, of Tucson, Ariz., a distinguished member of the bar of that State, who is very familiar with conditions in that judicial district, and I shall be pleased if the committee will hear him briefly in support of this bill.

Mr. Dunsenath, said in part: Mr. Chairman and gentlemen of the committee, I appreciate this opportunity for the simple reason that we have been laboring for probably six or eight years under difficulties in carrying on the business of the federal court in Arizona without any chance of getting the matters cleaned up at the end of the term. Judge Sawtelle has been working, to my personal knowledge, as earnestly as any man could work. He is now engaged in the trial of many cases of great importance not only to the litigants, but also of importance to the Government.

Judge Sawtelle hears cases involving matters pertaining to the Government forest reserves, the public lands, litigations where patents have been received by persons in the States, and for some reason or other the Government has attacked them. This requires considerable time and patience. The fact that we have so many foreign corporations doing business in that State also means that all those cases that might originate in the State courts are immediately transferred into the Federal courts, because they think they can get better results and because they think they can probably get a better hearing on the merits, and the litigants who are plaintiffs desire to have the cases tried before the Federal courts.

Mr. Hayden concluded the discussion by saying: I am aware, Mr. Chairman, that the committee is being requested to increase the number of judges all over the United States, owing to the large amount of legislation that has been passed by Congress increasing the jurisdiction of Federal courts. That applies in Arizona as to the prohibition law, the interstate commerce law, the hours of service act, the safety appliance act, the Harrison narcotic act, and all the other enacted in recent years. We have the same proportion of such increased Federal court business as elsewhere in the United States; and in addition to that there is a peculiar condition in Arizona which does not exist anywhere else in this country. I remember talking at one time with a Congressman from Indiana who stated that with some 3,000,000 people in that State they had but one Federal judge. He could not understand why in the State of Arizona with less than a half million people we should require an additional United States judge. However, in the State of Indiana there are no public lands or forest reserves or Indian reservations or Reclamation projects. In Arizona there are 20,000,000 acres of public lands going to patent about which litigation arises which must be settled in the Federal court.

We have over 13,000,000 acres in national forest reserves and every trespass case goes directly to the Federal court. We have over 20,000,000 acres of Indian reservations, all of which is within the jurisdiction of the Federal court, because every Indian is a ward of the Government. In addition to that the United States has invested over \$18,000,000 in reclamation projects in Arizona, and there are suits pending in the United States courts involving the reclamation fund.

Over 400 miles of our State adjoins the Mexican border, from which arises customs cases and violations of the immigration law. In addition there still is in effect an embargo on the shipment of arms into old Mexico, and there have been numerous cases involving violations of the President's embargo proclamation, which go to the Federal court.

Therefore we occupy a peculiar position which is vastly different from that of an ordinary State in the West because all of these various Federal interests pile up the business of the United States courts.

I assure you, gentlemen, you have no more meritorious bill before this committee, nor one where there is a more insistent and legitimate demand for the creation of an additional judge.

AMENDMENT TO ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE COMPANIA PROSPECTADORA MINERA DE OBREROS MEXICANOS, OF MORENCI, ARIZONA.

At a special meeting of the stockholders of the COMPANIA MINERA DE OBREROS MEXICANOS, a corporation, of Morenci, Arizona, held at Morenci, County of Greenlee, State of Arizona, on the third day of June, 1921, and upon at least thirty days notice in writing of a proposed increase of the capital stock having been given the stockholders of said corporation, the following amendment increasing the capital stock was adopted by the affirmative vote of the persons holding a majority of the issued and outstanding shares of stock of said corporation.

RESOLVED That Article four (4) of the Articles of Incorporation of the COMPANIA PROSPECTADORA MINERA DE OBREROS MEXICANOS be amended so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE IV. The capital stock of the corporation shall be ONE MILLION (\$1,000,000.00) DOLLARS divided into ONE MILLION shares of the par value of ONE DOLLAR (1.00) each, which shall be paid in at such times as the Board of Directors may designate, in cash, real or personal property, services, lease, option to purchase, or any other valuable right or thing for the uses and purposes of the corporation, and all shares of capital stock when issued in exchange therefor shall thereupon become and be fully paid the same as those paid for by cash at par, and shall be non-assessable forever, and the judgment of the Directors as to the value of any property, right or thing acquired in exchange for capital stock shall be conclusive.
