They Will Be Nicely Entertained.

The committee from the Beth Ahaba Congregation, charged with arranging for the entertainment of the delegates to the Council of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, is making excellent progress.

About \$1,500 has been pledged, and circulars were mailed this week asking contributors to remit to the treasurer.

At a recent meeting of the committee six members were added, and a reception committee of twenty-five was appointed.

The Report Was Adopted.

After an existence of one hundred and seven years the Congregation Beth Shalome on Sunday last formally dissolved its organization. The meeting was called to order at 11 o'clock A. M., with Mr. H. T. Ezekiel in the chair and Captain E. J. Levy secretary.

The report of the treasurer showed a cash balance on hand of \$579 50 and a sum in excess of \$1,000 due by the Sir Moses Montefiore Congregation on account of the synagogue purchased by them several years ago.

Captain E. J. Levy, Mr. J. L. Ezekiel, and Dr. E. C. Levy were appointed a committee to purchase a section in the Hebrew Cemetery and present the same to Mr. Joseph Cohn, who for more than twenty years has so efficiently filled the position of reader.

Captain E. J. Levy and Mr. J. L. Ezekiel were elected custodians of the portable property of the congregation, with the exception of the *megillah*, which was voted to Mr. N. S. Miller.

Upon motion it was ordered that the salaries of the reader and shammās be continued until next Rosh Hashonah.
