The death of Captain Stotzenburg, of the Sixth Cavalry, which occurred at Quingua, Philippine Islands, says the Albuquerque News, is deeply regretted by a large number of people in Albuquerque. He will be remembered as lieutenant and post quartermaster at Fort Wingate from 1887 to 1890. It was during his administration that the Government spent \$150,000 in rebuilding the post, all of which was under his personal supervision. General Carr was commandant at the time and he spoke of Captain Stotzenburg in words of highest praise for business abilities and strict honor and integrity. He was born Nov. 24, 1858. Graduated at West Point in 1877. He was a Jew.
