## Notice to Voters.

Notice is hereby given, that at a regular meeting of the board of supervisors of Navajo county, Arizona, held at their office on the 2nd day of April, 1900, it was ordered that a re-registration of all the voters of Navajo county, Arizona, be made. Register closes October 17, 1900.

Act No. 37, twentieth legislative assembly: Sec. 1. "No recorder, justice of the peace, or other officer authorized to register electors in any of the counties of the territory of Arizona, shall register or take the affidavit for the purpose of re-registration of any elector within this territory, unless such person desiring to be registered shall produce and exhibit to the registering officer a receipt showing that he has paid a poll tax for the year in which he is registering.

Sec. 2. "This act shall not apply to any person who is by law exempt from the payment of a poll tax. But in this event the person desiring to register must make affidavit to the facts that entitle him under the law to an exemption from the payment of a poll tax.

Sec. 3. "Any of the registering officers enumerated in section 1 of this act, or any that may hereafter be qualified to register electors, who enters the name of any person upon the great register of the county in which he is an officer, without requiring the person seeking to be registered to exhibit a poll tax for the year in which he is being registered, or taking the affidavit of such person showing he is exempt from the payment of poll tax, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to fine, upon conviction thereof, of not more than one hundred (\$100) dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not less than thirty days nor more than sixty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment."

## ARIZONA MATTERS....

Interesting Bits of Information Gathered from All Parts of the State.

Tempe is credited with a shipment of two cars of canaigre this week. They are bound for Liverpool, England.

A reward of \$750 is offered for the arrest and conviction of the parties who murdered the three Chinamen in Morenci a short time since.

The Coast Railway agent who took two hundred men from Phoenix a few weeks ago to work on that railroad, is in Phoenix again after more men.

A hydrophobia skunk bit the thumb of Bob Weaver while on the round-up in Graham county and in twenty six days he was dead. The wound healed and nothing more was thought of it until symptoms of hydrophobia set in.

Tiffany & Co., the diamond merchants of New York, have closed a deal for the Turquoise mine belonging to James Haas, near Chloride in Mohave county. The price paid for the property was \$150,000.

It will be welcome news to the miners of Northern Arizona to know that the smelter in course of construction at The Needles is rapidly approaching completion, and that it is expected that it will be in operation by August 1.

Edwin Payne, the Western Union messenger boy, was bitten on the foot by a rattlesnake at Brown's ranch, reports the Prescott Courier. Thomas Brown sucked the wound and made a slit in it. After having been given some brandy the boy was brought to town and was getting along all right at last accounts. The boy was walking around barefooted in the rhubarb patch when the snake bit him.

J. W. Abshire, the well-known sheep raiser, who has been in a San Francisco hospital for treatment of cancer, submitted on Saturday last to the painful operation of having the cancer cut from his face. He is improving slowly and the physicians are hopeful of his ultimate recovery.

On or about May 15, at Metcalf, Teidora Acosta murdered Cruz Rodriguez. The murderer escaped and succeeded in eluding the vigilance of the officers for some time. Constable Buckner located the murderer in the mountains near Dos Cabezas, Cochise county, and now has him in jail at Clifton awaiting preliminary trial.

In a cowboy camp at Casa Grandes, Mexico, Bob Lee shot and killed Andy Wilson. Both are well known American cowboys. Lee was asleep when Wilson entered the tent and put the muzzle of his Winchester to Lee's side. Lee grasped the barrel of the rifle with his left hand, drew his pistol and fired three shots into Wilson's breast.

There is a move on foot to erect a plant in Prescott for the manufacture of woodenware from the cedar which grows so plentifully in Yavapai county. Samples of this wood have been sent to Los Angeles and reported upon as being of an excellent quality. Should this project be carried out some \$25,000 will be invested and employment given to a number of men.

There was a killing at Guthrie on Tuesday evening, June 5. Simon Herrera, who has been working for G. E. Hopkins, came home and found Francisco Garcia playing the guitar for Mrs. Herrera. He took his axe and split Garcia's head open. He then pulled out the ridge pole that supported his jackal, letting the brush down on the dead man, drew his time, cashed his check and with his wife left for parts unknown. The dead body was not discovered until 24 hours later. The murderer and his wife are supposed to have gone towards Lordsburg.

The canaigre industry of the Salt River Valley is becoming very remunerative. The product is being shipped at the rate of fifteen cars a month, with a prospective increase to thirty cars. Canaigre could be made a most successful industry in Mohave county, as the plant grows luxuriantly in all the washes and

## INTEREST TO STOCKMEN.

Juan Terrazas resides in Mexico and is the cattle king of the world. Last season he branded 45,000 calves.

A shipment of 1,000 head of cattle was made from Bisbee last Saturday. Hugh Conlon was the shipper and they go to Colorado.

Kiddle Bros. sold four carloads of Oregon range bred unbroken horses and mares at Denver, Col. They received \$36 per head for the lot.

John Pringle of Rose, Kansas, sold at Kansas City recently 36 head of 1,293 pound steers, of his own feeding, at \$5.00. These cattle were of the "flying H" brand and were raised on Mr. Pringle's ranch in Arizona.

The State of Chihuahua, Mexico, has nearly 4,000,000 cattle. The country is well watered and has plenty of grass. There is no Texas fever or other diseases among cattle as the high altitude excludes them all.

It is reported that Swift & Co. are disposing of their sheep holdings and investing in cattle and grazing lands. It is well to watch these big investors, their object being to make as good a profit on beef this year as they did off sheep last year.

Col. William Ross of Pecos, N. M., has sold out his stock of cattle and ranch to Robbins Bros. for \$12,500. The sale was for 2,500 head, more or less. Mr. Ross will buy an alfalfa farm in the Roswell country and stock it with high grade Herefords.

The grand jury meets June 4 in Prescott, when Messrs. Barrett and Johnson, who tried the wholesale theft of Robert Blair's cattle by changing the B brand into quarter circle BE by adding the quarter circle and the E and "painting over" the B on some 40 head, will come up for a hearing. Their home is on Walnut creek.

From the United States England has purchased 18,000 mules and 8,000 horses for service in the Transvaal. The average price for the mules was about \$60 and for the horses \$75. The war in South Africa has been the means of turning loose among the farmers and stock raisers of the west and south \$1,680,000 for mules and horses, not to speak of the purchase of American meat and grain to supply the troops in the field.

At a few minutes of 9 o'clock the criminal, attended by Father Persons and Jailer Lucero, walked with a firm step up to the gallows platform. About one hundred spectators were present. These observed the utmost silence while Ruiz, from the platform, delivered a short address in Spanish, which was interpreted by Nestor Montoya. He said that his terrible crime had been caused by drink, which had been responsible for all the evil he had ever done. He urged parents to train their children to avoid this curse. He had made his peace with his Maker and was ready to suffer the penalty of a life for a life. The doomed man, with the shadow of eternity closing over him, then calmly stepped upon the death trap and took one last glance at things terrestrial before the black cap was pressed down upon his head and the trap sprung.

Thomas Williams of the Agricultural Department at Washington, is in Tucson investigating the ranges for the purpose of ascertaining if certain grasses can be grown successfully in this country, which will insure good constant feed for stock.

Ranchers are putting in a large acreage this season, as it bids fair to be one of the best in several years. Rain has so far been abundant and frequent, and should they continue the yield of all kinds of crops will be unusually large.—Coconino Sun.

It is singular why Northern Arizona is so free from sheep disease, which has almost destroyed the herds of the states further south and in low altitudes. The scientists of the Department of Agriculture, aware of the wonderfully heavy losses that occur every year from parasites in sheep, have undertaken extensive experiments, and have discovered that the parasite not only in the alimentary canal, but also in the lungs, and the grubs in the head can be completely eradicated by light doses of gasoline.

JOSE P. RUIZ HANGED.

### The Criminal Talks to the Crowd Was Game to the Last.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., June 1.—Jose Ruiz, aged 23, who murdered a five-year-old child in this city in May, 1896, was hanged at the county jail at Old Albuquerque this morning. Nine minutes after the drop fell the murderer was pronounced dead.
