Notice to Voters. Notice is hereby given, that at a regular meeting of the board of supervisors of Navajo county, Arizona, held at their office on the 2nd day of April, 1900, it was ordered that a re-registration of all the voters of Navajo county, Arizona, be made. Register closes October 17, 1900. Act No. 37, twentieth legislative assembly. Sec. 1. "No recorder, justice of the peace or other officer authorized to register electors in any of the counties of the territory of Arizona, shall register or take the affidavit for the purpose of re-registration of any elector within this territory, unless such person desiring to be registered shall produce and exhibit to the registering officer a receipt showing that he has paid a poll tax for the year in which he is registering. Sec. 2. "This act shall not apply to any person who is by law exempt from the payment of a poll tax. But in this event the person desiring to register must make affidavit to the facts that entitle him under the law to an exemption from the payment of a poll tax. Sec. 3. "Any of the registering officers enumerated in section 1 of this act, or any other officer authorized to register electors, who enters the name of any person upon the great register of the county in which he is an officer, without requiring the person seeking to be registered to exhibit a poll tax for the year in which he is being registered, or taking the affidavit of such person showing he is exempt from the payment of poll tax, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to fine, upon conviction thereof, of not more than one hundred (\$100) dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not less than thirty days nor more than sixty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment."
