LOCAL NEWS.

Mr. Morgan, of Show Low, was in town on Monday.

Romulo Tafolla has been appointed a Constable for St. Johns precinct.

Francisco Baca, brother to our County Treasurer, has returned from Fort Apache.

George H. Miller left town last Friday for Mexico. He is making the journey overland.

Wells, Fargo & Co. have taken charge of the baggage business on the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad.

Albert Banta and Alex. Pechner returned from Holbrook on Monday, by private conveyance.

The Board of Supervisors have allowed four hundred dollars for the building of a calaboose at Holbrook.

Mr. Nelson, of Washington, a member of the Ethnological Department of the Smithsonian Institute, is in the city.

Dr. Dalby has been appointed clerk to the Board of Supervisors in place of T. S. Bunch, who intends removing to Holbrook.

A large stack of fine hay, stolen by the Mormon church from the poor deluded followers of Brigham Young, can be seen in the titling house yard.

A Justice of the Peace and a Constable at Holbrook, have been ordered by the Board of Supervisors to furnish new bonds, one of their sureties having withdrawn.

Mr. Alcock is temporarily in charge of the Navajo Indian Agency. Agent Bowman having resigned to take the position of manager of the Defiance Cattle Company.

Mr. Yarrow, who for the past ten days has been visiting the Indian villages at Zuni, passed through town the first of the week, en route to his ranch near Springerville.

Robert and James Scott, the pioneer sheep raisers of the county, and who are the owners of large ranch interests near Show Low, were visitors at the county seat the first of the week.

Rev. James G. Everhart has been appointed, by the Arizona Mission of the Methodist Episcopal Church, to take charge of the churches at Holbrook and Flagstaff. St. Johns is to be supplied as soon as possible.

Alphabetical Milner, son of Elder and Apostle J. B. Milner, is now, during the absence of his paternal ancestor engaged in grinding out weekly strains of doleful music on that wonderful latter-day hurdy-gurdy known as the Orion Era.

An adjourned meeting of the Board of Supervisors will be held in this city, on Tuesday, the 20th instant. Mr. H. Huning, Chairman of the Board, who for the past two weeks has been confined at his home at Show Low, by sickness, is expected to be present at this meeting.

A special meeting of the Board of Supervisors is hereby called to meet Sept. 23, 1885, for the purpose of issuing an order to the Sheriff, not to take prisoners out of jail to their meals, but to have their meals taken to them in jail.

When the following order, by request of J. L. Hubbell, Sheriff, was made in pursuance to the above call: The Sheriff of Apache county, is hereby directed and ordered, that in the future the prisoners confined in the county jail, are to have their meals brought to them and given to them in the jail, and not allowed to be taken out in town to the hotels, or any other place for their meals.

The sum of \$400 was appropriated for the purpose of building a jail at Holbrook. Tee and Leonard voting aye; absent and not voting, Mr. Huning.

The Clerk of the Board was instructed to notify Mr. A. M. Boyer, Justice of the Peace at Holbrook, that Harry Scorse, one of the sureties on his bond, as Justice of the Peace, of Holbrook Precinct, had withdrawn, and that he is required to give additional bond by the next regular meeting of this Board.

Also to notify Joseph Elliott that Harry Scorse, one of the sureties on his bond, as Constable of said Holbrook Precinct, had withdrawn, and that he is required to give additional bonds by the next regular meeting of this Board.
