One has but to spend five minutes there to appreciate its abominably unhealthy condition, choose the brightest and balmiest day you may, and in the jail there stomach of the hardiest. The circumstances and conveniences considered, it is carefully and cleanly kept, but when six or ten men constantly live, eat, smoke and answer the calls of nature, within a space of thirty feet square, sufficient purity of atmosphere for ordinary health is impossible. 
