## LOCAL NEWS.

Hon. A. F. Banta passed Navajo last Sunday going east.

Don Pedro Montano was on our streets last Monday.

Sheriff Campbell came in on last Friday's buckboard from Winslow.

The Atlantic and Pacific are leveling the ground between the tracks at Holbrook.

Krentz & Wolff, Winslow butchers, have built and moved into new quarters on railroad avenue.

Don Solomon Luna and a Mr. Sena, from Santa Fe, New Mexico, arrived in our town last Monday.

If the good Lord don't give us rain, and plenty of it, pretty soon, there will be a good many 'busted' men in this county.

A. J. Gray is clerking for Chas. Flinn, and Judge J. H. Wilson is measuring silks and laces for Col. J. H. Breed, the pioneer merchant of Winslow.

Supervisors Morgan and La Prade arrived about nine o'clock on the morning of the 1st. Don Leandro Ortega did not get in until Monday morning last.

Alejandro Peralta, Luis Chaves and his two brothers, returned from Holbrook last Sunday afternoon, where they had been to deliver and ship their spring clip of wool.

The sheepmen of Concho shipped something over 80,000 pounds of wool from Holbrook, of which amount Don Juan Candelaria, we are informed, owned 23,000.

The press and some other material pertaining to the newspaper business, which was sent to Holbrook last October, was reshipped to Kingman, a few days since, consigned to J. A. Whitmore.

Jim Owens, range foreman for Hart & Campbell, on the head waters of the Blue, arrived in the city last Friday evening. Says grass and water are shorter than ever before known.

Heard on the street the other day that ex-County Treasurer Greer has purchased a flock of sheep. Do not vouch for the truthfulness of the story. Rather risky, just at this time, to buy any kind of live stock, or for that matter, any other property.

J. T. Lesueur, Prison Commissioner, left on last Friday morning's buckboard for Yuma. It is said that at the meeting of the Commission now in session the management of the prison will be thoroughly investigated and a superintendent appointed.

The Fourth was observed in St. Johns with the wanted patriotism of our people. The programme published two weeks since was carried out, and all who were given parts, acquitted themselves with credit and to the entire satisfaction of the people.

T. G. Norris, who was at one time a resident of this place but latterly making his home at Flagstaff, has formed a co-partnership with J. C. Herndon in the practice of law, and will change his residence to Prescott. Herndon & Norris will make a strong team.

Says the Albuquerque Citizen: F. A. Hubbell came up from Pajarito to day, but returned yesterday from the Zuni mountains, where he has his flocks of sheep grazing. He states that the mountains are dryer now than ever known before, and that sheep raisers are trying hard to prevent their flocks from dying.

The ladies of Winslow, we are informed, took quite an active part in the recent school election, and it was stubbornly contested from start to finish. But it is characteristic of the ladies of that place—they never do anything by halves—but go at any and everything they undertake heart and soul.

Winslow is growing quite rapidly, in addition to the five cottages built by the railroad employees building and loan association, A. C. Demarest is finishing a store building with basement, to be divided into three flats. Tenants are already secured as soon as finished.

Jack Porter and his partner have sold their saloon business in Gallup to Major J. W. Green. Jack informed the writer when in St. Johns last that he intended visiting his former home in "Old Kaintuck" some time this summer or fall, and that if fortune smiled on him, he might come back with one of the blue grass belles as Mrs. Porter. Hope he may, he deserves a good wife.

Louis Huning, Esq., of Los Lunas, New Mexico, recently sold and delivered at Albuquerque 500 head of cattle to a Mr. Peters of Colorado. It is rumored that Mr. Huning intends going out of the cattle business altogether and running sheep exclusively. He owns water privileges now that commands a large scope of country, and is still adding to it by purchasing other ranches.

The brick made at Winslow are said to be a very superior quality. Sheriff Campbell and T. T. Hines, a practical and experienced brick-maker, realizing this fact, have gone into the manufacture of brick on quite an extensive scale, and expect as soon as the quality of their production becomes known and appreciated, to do a large shipping business, both east and west from that point.

Dr. Craig was promenading our streets last Friday morning with an air of one who was monarch of all he surveyed—wanted to shake and smile with every one he met, and looked and acted as if he had heard of the death of a rich uncle who had made him his sole heir, and that the future now possessed no terrors worthy of a moment's thought. After a while it began to be whispered around that his wife had that morning presented him with a fine boy. The problem of his extraordinarily exuberant feelings was at once solved, and congratulations numerous and hearty immediately followed.

F. W. Nelson, Joe Bargman and J. D. Murray started about ten days ago to hunt up some New Mexico sheep which had been driven into the county for grazing purposes. They succeeded in finding about 15,000 belonging to Don Solomon Luna, of Los Lunas, New Mexico, assessed them, cut out a sufficient number to pay taxes and costs, left Messrs. Bargman and Murray in charge of them and Mr. Nelson returned to St. Johns. Word was sent to Mr. Luna and he arrived early last Monday morning, paid the tax and costs and the sheep were released. The sheriff's office performed its whole duty in this matter. There is another law, however, for the protection of sheep men which was violated by driving sheep into the county without inspection and which should be rigidly enforced in every instance. Several sheepmen have complained to us that their flocks had become badly infected by scab from coming in contact with migratory herds. This law was gotten up and enacted at the instance and for the protection of wool growers, and places it in their power to prevent any such damage to their flocks, and if they don't see fit to use the power given them, they should neither receive nor expect any sympathy for any loss they may sustain. Had this law been enforced it would have cost Mr. Luna \$700 or \$800 more for

driving his sheep in on us. It may look hard and unfeeling to transgressors of this law, and even to disinterested outsiders, to advocate its rigid enforcement, but self-preservation is the first law of nature. It is a well-known fact that from the scarcity of feed and water in this county the loss in both cattle and sheep have been unprecedentedly heavy, and that the danger is not yet over. It is equally as well known that the only feed we have now is confined to the mountains, and that it is not sufficient for the needs of the stock owned by the residents of the county. In view of these facts, we hold that it is the imperative duty of every official to use all the power and every means vested in him by the law to protect his constituents in their persons and property, and if he fails is guilty of misfeasance and should be punished for dereliction of duty.

CONCHO, June 30, 1893.

EDITOR HERALD—It was quite interesting to me a couple of weeks ago to notice that it was at last found out that in the centre of Apache county, was a little thriving place called Concho, and that there was more people west of St. Johns than Pedro Montana. I hope we will in future find that there is a live and enterprising people in Apache county, and it should please me very much if I could find some one, or some parties, that would help me in what I think is the most important of all questions, and that is water. I have a drill and have spent eight months in drilling for artesian water. I found everywhere plenty of water at a depth of fifteen feet, and at 125 feet it rose 25 feet in a few minutes, but because of the lack of help and the impossibility of getting the necessary cash to buy some additional tools that were necessary to a continuance of the work, I was obliged to give it up for the present. Yet here is the machine, and it will work in any formation, to any depth. I honestly believe that I can get good water anywhere, by going below the brackish water the people are now obliged to use. Now if there is any one in Apache county who is interested in building it up and getting it settled, I would like to hear from them, especially if they have the courage to spend a few hundred dollars in developing artesian water.

THE HERALD has always entertained the opinion that artesian water could be found in almost any portion of Apache county, and particularly west and north from St. Johns, at a depth of from three to six hundred feet. We would like to see Mr. Kemp's efforts in this direction seconded, and think that some of our men of means should co-operate with him in this important matter. The cost would not be very great, and it unsuccessful no one would be seriously injured. On the other hand, if it were once demonstrated that flowing water could be obtained in our valleys and on our lower mesas, the benefits resulting therefrom would be incalculable. The barren and waste places that are now an eye-sore, would be dotted with beautiful homes, occupied by happy, prosperous and contented families.

## Notice to Property Holders.

Page 465, Par. 2641, Sec. 15, Revised Statutes of 1887. It shall be the duty of every person owning or having charge of property in this Territory subject to taxation, and as in this Act provided, to make out and deliver to the Assessor, between the first Monday in March and the first Monday in June in each year, a correct list of the same as required by law, whether he shall receive from the Assessor a notice or demand to do so or not; and every assessment made against property subject to taxation shall be valid, whether such notice or demand was received or not.

The list shall contain: 1st. Land by section, township and range; 2d. Town lots by town, lot and block. 3d. Improvements on all said lands and town lots. 4d. All personal property of every kind and description held by him or under his charge or control. Said list shall be signed by the said person and sworn to by the person making it.
