### A SUMMER OUTING IN THE COUVER DALENES.

#### BEING A TRUTHFUL ACCOUNT

Of the Hair Breadth Escapes, Wonderful Adventures and Great Hardships of two Prospectors and Four Jackasses, IN NORTH-EASTERN WASHINGTON AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

During the Summer of 1889. From a Diary kept by George Macomber, and Edited by an old Correspondent of the Leader.

There is a custom prevailing among authors to begin their publications upon the public with a lofty preface, containing an apology or explanation thereof.

I have nothing of the kind to offer. I make no pretensions to skill in the art descriptive, a fact which I greatly deplore, for in no locality in the world are the subtleties of nature more abundant or striking, than in the mountainous regions through which our wanderings led us this summer. My readers will therefore content themselves with a plain narrative, plainly written, and as "facts concisely stated," according to a recent high authority, the true art of composition. I have no doubt the readers of the LEADER will at least follow me through the wanderings of our journey without wearying.

One must needs live in a locality where the precious metals exist in their natural and hidden conditions before he is liable to that fever, that when once contracted, is seldom allayed except by that potent fabricage, death, whose chilly breath has power to cool even the ardent pulse of the "gold fever" patient.

There are different stages of this disease, and the chronic prospector, he who never tires of the search for hidden treasures, nor becomes discouraged with a lifetime of failures in the attempt to discover it, is only an advanced stage of the disease.

Again I deplore my poor powers of description; for here I would delight to give your readers a pen picture of the genus homo to which I, unfortunately for myself and all who are interested in my welfare, belong.

The prospector, were he sensible of his pitiable condition, would be an object for the commiseration of all the rest of mankind, for his life is almost universally made up of disappointments and extreme hardships and, as a rule, ends in poverty. Occasionally the poor fellow "staggers onto" something, but only in rare instances does he profit by his luck. There is a class of men always on the alert for him, and when he succeeds in "making a strike," they usually manage to "chisel" him out of it. These "mining experts," "capitalists" etc., abound in every mining camp and spend their time in the hotels of the town, while the poor prospector is climbing the rugged mountain sides in pursuit of his wondrous vocation.

No sooner is it known that he has made a discovery, than they begin to lay plans to secure his ledge. His poverty makes him an easy prey, for he is unable to develop it if a quartz claim, and in nine instances out of ten these sharpers "bond" it for a few hundreds or thousands, or by buying an interest, form a stock company and freeze him out with assessments.

Their attitude toward the prospector, forcibly reminds me of an occurrence that I witnessed, not once, but many times while I was living in Alaska. A few hogs are raised in Juneau, which subsist principally upon shell-fish upon the beach. Ravens also abound in great numbers all along the coast and grow fat upon the same toothsome provender that the porkers revel in. Now if there is any bird or animal on earth that is one half so cunning as an Alaska raven, I have it yet to see, and the relation of the following illustration of their outness will, I think, explain my admiration for them:

I have seen these cunning creatures perch upon a hog's back and resting comfortably just behind his ears, watch until the good-natured animal had unrolled a fat clare, when down he would hop and secure it before the pig was aware of his intention. More than this, I have seen him fly with his ill-gotten food to the nearest rock, well out of his injured pig's reach, and laugh; actually laugh in a most derisive and provoking manner at the discomfited pig.

I hope the application of my story is apparent to all, and without further digression upon the woes of the prospector, after informing you that he is only miserable in the abstract, not being sensible of his miseries, but usually the happiest fellow alive, I will allow you to draw your own conclusions regarding his life and characteristics from the narrative that follows:

During the early portion of the winter of '88-'9, there appeared in Weston a little avalanche that attracted public attention at once, by its comical grotesqueness. It was composed of an unusually tall, angular man, four extreme small Mexican donkeys or burros, and a dog. So extremely tall was this individual and so diminutive were the donkeys, that it was possible for him to stand upon his toes and allow the animals to pass under him. The dog was in keeping with his companions, and was long and lank and lean, a pot hound of a pronounced type. The man, after making inquiries as to prices of necessities etc., expressed a determination to winter in the town and was seen comfortably domiciled among us, jackasses, dog and all. It was learned that he was a professional prospector, driven to winter quarters by the inclemency of the weather. I soon formed his acquaintance and the result was the forming of a partnership between us for the purpose of prospecting in the Couver da Alene and Salmon river mountains the ensuing summer.

Our arrangements for the trip were soon complete, and when the Couver plant had begun to put forth its yellow umbels, the Curlew to circle overhead with its ear piercing shrieks, and the blue-green bunch-grass to shoot from its protecting tussocks, which are not harbingers of, but evidences sure that spring has begun in Eastern Oregon, then we began our journey.

I presume that it is necessary at this juncture to introduce my readers to the parties whose fortunes they are presumed to follow through this and succeeding chapters.

Bill, my "partner," was as I have described, angular in person, and as usual in such instances, eccentric in disposition as in body. He had spent the greater portion of his life in the mountain ranges, and upon just such quests as the one we were then engaged in. He was an excellent hunter, a practical and experienced prospector, and aside from his personal peculiarities which were not particularly disagreeable, as agreeable a companion as I have ever traveled with. His portion of the animal outfit had been mentioned. Mine consisted of two horses; one saddle horse and a pack animal, a dog, and Winchester rifle 45-70, model of '76. My animals were both of the ordinary Cayuse breed, and endowed with all the caudeness characteristic of the stock. My saddle horse, "Billy," was homelick during the whole summer, and never missed an opportunity to attempt a return to his old range, and my pack animal, a mare, was invariably at his heels. I have sometimes thought when more than usually provoked by a tiresome chase after these runaways, that this creature whom I learned to detest most thoroughly, was the instigator in these attempts to return home, for I had frequently observed her "assing" Billy away from camp, always bringing up closely in the rear. They were a constant source of annoyance, and we were compelled to keep them closely hobbled or staked, even when the grass was excellent.

Bill's burros, however were perfect campers. We had no more fear of their deserting us than we had of waking in the morning and finding our dogs gone. I have often thought since becoming acquainted with the habits and extraordinary intelligence of these oftentimes when we attempted to cast aspersions upon an enemy by calling him an ass, we might as well worthy animal. "Write me down an ass" is an expression not so pregnant with debasement to me now. "Spit in my face and call me a horse" was Falstaff's idea of ignominy. He evidently had a Cayuse horse in mind, which was more just and appropriate than to cast slurs at the more intelligent and in every way more worthy jackasses. "Jumbo" was a large and well proportioned fellow, weighing perhaps six hundred and fifty pounds. Although more stubborn than his mates, he was our standby in all difficult situations and his master's especial favorite. Was there a difficult trail to pass, Jumbo was placed in the lead. He was the first to cross the dangerous ford, the first to leap the dangerous tree in the trail. By his extreme caution with his pack it was seldom necessary to replace it and as a reward for his excellent behavior, old Jumbo was usually the first to be freed of his load upon arrival at camp and the last one loaded upon our departure from it. "Mocha" and "Chape" were younger and lacked much of the wisdom that long experience had taught their more elderly companions, but did their duty well. Although too diminutive in size for most purposes, the adaptability of these animals for the use of the prospector is perfect. They pack with apparent ease a load of one hundred and fifty pounds and ascend and descend the rough mountain sides like goats. It is a commonly accepted opinion among mountain men that a burro will travel where a man can go without holding by his hands.

Our dogs, although to figure to some extent in these pages, were of common breed, with no striking characteristics. Mine was a shepherd pup that was allowed to follow me because he "loved me for myself alone." So plainly apparent was this fact, that I had not the heart to part with him, and as I shall show farther on, owe my life to his devotion, and another trifling circumstance.
