#### State Affairs.

The Prescott Journal Miner, which is owned by Governor Trille, comes to life again in its last issue, by calling the citizens of Tombstone poor impotent wretches. It calls an article recently published in THE DAILY TOMSTONE, a "vile, murderous, malicious and brutal article," and has the following to say in regard to the meeting which was held in this city on the 5th of October:

"The meeting was a disgrace to the people of Arizona, and the account, as published in THE DAILY TOMSTONE of that date, cannot fail to receive the condemnation of all good citizens, regardless of their opinions and prejudices. The publication was of the very lowest order of malicious and unprincipled journalism, yet it voiced in some particulars the opinions of a small minority of our citizens. The price required of Governor Trille for its favor by the rabble of Tombstone, was his active opposition to General Crook. And in securing the immediate and peremptory removal of Crook and we will endorse your actions, was the effect of the proposition of the Tombstone Gang to the Governor. Unless he 'stood in' with them on that proposition they would furnish no funds for the protection of their neighbors from savage atrocities and they would open the vials of their wrath upon him.

Poor, impotent wretches, they had mistaken their man, Governor Trille has faith in General Crook, and will stand by him, besides he is the last man in the world to profit at a fellow man's expense. He spurned their proposition with contempt, and completed their disgrace by allowing him to personally subscribe \$1,000 to aid in outfitting a company of rangers to give warning and protection to exposed settlers.

Whether or not these proceedings had ought to do with the Governor's resignation we cannot say, but it is more than likely that they had. It is a source of much regret to the best citizens throughout Arizona that this misguided rabble should have disgraced their community in such a manner. Governor Trille's action in the premises cannot fail to win for him the hearty approval of an appreciative people, who will welcome him to private life with disappointment at the loss of his eminent public services, but with pride at the acquisition of such a noble and generous private citizen.

#### INDIANS.

The following from the Prescott Courier contain some truths and a great many untruths, and shows how far a journal published in Prescott will do in order to get government pay and have their fancy job work done by the government printer at Whipple. Surely Crook owns the newspapers of Prescott, as he does their editors:

Elsewhere in this paper will be found recorded ideas of prominent Easterners, who think they know all about saving the savages, but who are very much mistaken. These people have branches of their "barros" down in Southeastern Arizona, and although their agents there ought to know a little something about Indians, they do not display any knowledge of the red rascals, nor throw any new light on them. Their efforts are mainly directed to thwarting efforts of General Crook and his soldiers to catch and punish the hostiles. They have lied outrageously about the number of whites that have been killed in the late raids; they scare timid people and cause a good many Eastern people to believe that danger lurks on every road and trail in Arizona, when it is a fact that the bad Indians were recently driven into Mexico; that they are discouraged and, we honestly think, about "ready to throw up the sponge." Mortal man can do no better than General Crook is doing. His presence here has kept the out from getting recruits from the ins, i. e. Indians on the reservations. The watchfulness of his officers, soldiers and guides has kept the outlaws from committing more crimes—has worried them until they dare not stay in Arizona. All summer long, soldiers have toiled across mountains and plains, trying their very best to come up with the renegades. We have read of tired, famished, foot-sore soldiers, and they, poor unfortunates, have received naught save slurs and insults from a majority of writers of Arizona and New Mexico, many of whom are, like Clum, of the Tombstone Record-Epithaph, ex-soldiers, who have old accounts to settle with army officers. The wonder is that people down there countenance such diabolism in those masked servants of the Indian King, who believe they can, by vilifying

Crook, have him removed and a man they can handle put in his place. But they reckon without their host, for government and people will not soon forget Crook's brilliant exploits in California, in Washington Territory, in Idaho in Arizona and on the plains. A brigadier-general he is, sure enough. Yes, a brigadier-general who has never been given rest from labor in the field; a brigadier who, although a strict disciplinarian, is loved and respected by officers, soldiers, everybody save the Indian King crowd, who have, upon various occasions, tried to have him assassinated. He is a brigadier who has never yet asked a soldier to take more chances or endure more privations than himself. When in the Sierra Madre, far from home and country, with a handful of Americans and over 100 Indian soldiers; with jealous Mexicans doing their best to thwart him, and with home traitors snarling in his rear, he took pot luck with his comrades, washed his own clothing and came out victorious. Shame upon a people who will allow base wretches to malign such a man as General Crook, who for about thirty years of his life has been on the frontier, fighting and managing Indians, while many of those who assail him were plundering the people and the Indians, and who are now doing everything in their power to prolong trouble, with the hope that the Howard-Collier prayer and stealing plan will again be tried, and so give John Pissilaminous Clum and his promoters chances to replenish their pockets.
