Gold on the North Coast.

The following is taken from the Alta California:
"The steamship Idaho brought \$70,000 in gold dust from Douglas Island. News from the Cassiar gold fields say the hill diggings struck on Dease Creek give \$14 to a pan of earth.

The working of placer diggings in Silver Bow Basin is enjoined by N. A. Fuller, who claims the basin by virtue of an original location. Some miners paid \$5,000 for their claims and have not been able to work more than two weeks during the whole season on account of injunctions.

The report of the Government officer who visited Granite Creek mines is published. He gives a glowing account of the prospect for miners there. He saw \$400 taken out in a rooker in a single afternoon by two men. Several claims are yielding from \$250 to \$400 a day.
