Regulations in Regard to Free Transport of Exhibits.

Any of our citizens who may think of sending articles for exhibition to the Phenix Fair will be interested in the following circular which has been issued by the Southern Pacific Co.:

GENERAL FREIGHT OFFICE,
SAN FRANCISCO Aug. 16, 1886.

To Agents:

Shipments originating within the territory of Arizona intended for exhibition at the Industrial Exposition at Phenix Ariz., should be waybilled at regular rates to Maricopa and charges collected on delivery.

On returning the agent at Maricopa will waybill the freight with charges and owners will call upon the agent at original shipping point present certificate from Secretary of the Industrial exposition that property has not changed hands while on exhibition and also expense bill for charges paid at Maricopa. The agent will then deliver the property free of charge refund the amount collected at Maricopa, receipt the expense bill for return service and send both with the secretary's certificate to the treasurer as cash.

Articles originating in the State of California and in the territory of New Mexico will pay full rates to Maricopa and upon return, if accompanied by certificate of the Secretary, as above provided agent will bill to original shipping point free.

Disastrous Earthquake. Special to THE DAILY TOMBSTONE.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Sept. 2.—An earthquake such as has never before been known in the history of this city, shook Charleston last night shortly after 10 o'clock, causing more loss and injury to property and far more loss of life than the cyclone of year before. The city is wrecked and the streets are encumbered with masses of bricks and broken telegraph and telephone wires, impossible to pass from one part of the city to the other. The first shock was by far the most severe. The people with their families passed the night in the street which even this morning are crowded with people afraid to enter their homes. More than sixty persons were killed and wounded, chiefly colored. Many whites were killed. Those fatally injured are M. J. Lynch, Dr. R. Alexander Hamilton and Ainsley Robertson. A fire broke out in different parts of the city immediately after the earthquake and some are still burning, but there is no danger of its spreading. There is no way of leaving the city at present. It cannot be accurately estimated, but it is safe to place \$500,000 as the loss.

During the night fifteen to twenty were killed, and a much greater number wounded in all sorts of ways. The loss of human life will be large and it will take several days to get the accurate number.

SOPIA, Sept. 2.—Zankoff, the Russian who was the leading spirit in the recent revolution, has been arrested and placed under a strong guard the members of which have been ordered to keep him under constant surveillance, as it is feared he may commit suicide. The revolutionary troops retreated to heights of Sofia which they occupied. The loyal troops surrounded

ed them and compelled them to surrender and then disarmed them, placing the officers under arrest.
