Mr. C. D. Henry, of Mineral Hill, was in town Monday. He came down to meet Mrs. Henry on her return from San Francisco.

Mr. Fred Adams, of the King, was in town this week. He had a severe attack of sickness last week, but has entirely recovered from the effects of it.

Mr. Dearnitt was one of the first pioneers of that district, and says the change it has undergone in the way of settlement between the time of his first and last visit is remarkable.

Mr. Dolson, who has been spending some time in the Cumabibi mining district, returned to his Florence home, Monday, looking improved in health, and mentioning some of his old-time good nature and joviality.

Thirty thousand dollars in Silver King bullion passed through here Wednesday, on the way to San Francisco. On the same day, one thousand dollars in Mack Mercantile passed through on the way to New York.

Thomas Meers, Wilson and Leblanc will continue to run a semi-weekly line between Florence and Mineral Hill. The stage will leave here Wednesday and Saturday morning of each week and return on the same day.

Mrs. W. Tweed, of El Capitan, was in Florence this week on business. He is now the eye of making an important mining sale, and we would not be at all surprised to see him wearing the hat of a rich man some of these fine mornings.

Matters are getting lively up at Mineral Hill and the inevitable contest over claims has commenced. It is to be hoped that all disputes will be speedily and amicably adjusted, as litigation retards the growth and development of a camp.

We understand that there is more freight at Casa Grande for the different camps in this county than there are freight teams to haul it. This speaks volumes for the growing business of the smallest, but best county in the Territory.

District Attorney Summers, his wife and daughter, left for San Francisco yesterday. Mrs. Summers and Miss Juana will not return to Florence, we understand, at least till the latter has completed her education. They have our good wishes.

Hinson, Thomas appeared in the role of audience, at the residence of Hon. Grant Oury, Saturday, and made a decided success of the business. He managed to get a considerable advance over the cost price of many of the articles sold. All the goods sold well.

Eighty-five dollars were contributed by our business men Saturday, for the purpose of repairing the wa. on road between here and Mineral Hill, and the work is now under headway. When completed this will be a splendid road. There will be no grades on it worthy the name.

Mr. Robt. Williams, of Pinal, who has been east for some weeks past, returned Monday, and after spending several days looking after business matters here, went on to Pinal. He never looked better and the trip was undoubtedly a great benefit to him in the way of improving his health.

We were pleased to meet Monday, the Rev. G. H. Adams, who has charge of all the churches in Arizona belonging to the Methodist Episcopal Church, and on next Sabbath will dedicate a new church at Tucson, which he will take a vacation and come to spend it.

Mr. Bennett brought down from the Pinal mine, Monday, 21,000 pounds of concentrates, which will be shipped from Casa Grande to St. Louis. There are 49,000 pounds waiting transportation from the mine to the depot, making in all, 70,000 pounds. This worth at least, according to \$1 per pound.

Mr. G. H. Adams and wife, of Cleveland, Ohio, passed through here Wednesday, on their way from Globe and Silver King. Mrs. Hatcher came out here to take a look at Arizona mines, and goes home with the impression that the mines of this Territory have not been overestimated.

Mineral Hill Notes.

MINERAL HILL, Nov. 3d. The Alice south mine, having reached 100 feet from surface, is showing a fine body of ore, which assays from 31 to 419 ounces in silver. The new cut through the north croppings shows the chlorides to be even more extensive than at first supposed.

The Pacific mine, at a depth of 40 feet has a pay streak carrying galena of two and one-half feet, and ranging from 25 to 100 ounces in silver.

The Time Keeper has a cross-cut started at 50 feet and is in 16 feet, showing ore all the way. The shaft is producing a fine lot of galena, and is improving as depth is attained.

Work is progressing favorably on several other claims in the district and all showing well. The camp has a new house, put up by the parties working the Alice. It is the first board house in the place. There are several other new tents erected, and the camp is fast assuming the place it deserves.

The Present Mer states that Floyd, the murderer of American Charlie, has escaped. It is not quite so bad as that, brother Beach, though it amounts to little more. He was taken to Yuma by Mr. Andrew Hall last week, and safely lodged in the Territorial prison under a sentence of five years. Considering the heinousness of the crime he committed, this light punishment might be justly called an "escape."

Mr. Louis Nel, of San Francisco, and general western agent for English fire insurance companies, was here Wednesday. It is his first trip to this section and he expresses himself as pleased with both the climate and the country, and especially so with Florence and the Gila valley. He will report us favorably on his return to Frisco, he says, and expects to send some responsible men out here to invest in property.

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Mr. W. C. Smith, administrator of the Stiles estate, sold at public sale on Monday, all the cattle belonging to said estate. There were but few bidders on the ground, but the cattle sold well.

The first lot, 26 head, brought \$25 per head, the second lot, 75 head, brought \$28.85 per head; 100 cows, without calves, brought \$21.50 per head; 104, more or less, yearlings, brought \$13.75 per head. The buyers were Mr. Carrigan and Mr. Schletter.

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The Arctic Mine.

This property, belonging to Wm. E. Guild and Jose M. Ochoa, of Florence, and located in Old Hat district, is showing up encouragingly. A few days since, the men at work on the claim struck a seven-inch streak of quartz on the hanging wall, carrying free gold in large quantities. The ledge between the walls is seven feet wide, and averages \$20 in gold. There are about thirty tons of ore on the dump now, and three men are at work on the shaft. A good mill-site has been located in connection with the claim, and on the former is an abundance of water for milling purposes. This is undoubtedly a splendid piece of property, and will in time bring its owners a handsome 'stake.'

This district, from which small lots of very rich rock have been shipped during the last six months to San Francisco, where it was reduced, giving very handsome returns, is about to enter upon a new era of great prosperity. Heretofore, the greatest drawback was a lack of water. Mr. Jerry Fryer, one of the parties most largely interested in the mines of the district, came near dying a few months ago from thirst and heat, in the district he has recently struck a good flow of water near the surface. Now the last obstacle to the development of mines in this promising district has been removed, and we learn that a force of miners will be permanently at work taking out rich ore from the mines of Mr. Fryer, in that district, which is one of the best mineral sections in the Territory. Col. Brady and Judge Walker have been engaged all summer taking out ore and shipping it to San Francisco, which has worked \$200 to the ton. The mines of these gentlemen are located a few miles from those of Mr. Fryer. At these claims water can be had by sinking eight feet. The discovery of an abundant supply of water in Casa Grande district proves conclusively that water exists in much larger supply in the Territory than is generally supposed, and that miners should not be disheartened about water until an effort is made to secure it. In Castle Dome district miners 'sacked water on burros a distance of fifteen miles for over twelve months, and by accident it became necessary to sink a hole in the camp, and before they had gone four feet a splendid supply of good water was found. We believe it can be secured in most sections of the Territory if persons will only make an effort to find it.—Journal.
