The Result. We cannot give the exact result of the election in this county till after the Supervisors meet and canvass the vote, but it is certain that Hon. G. H. Oury will carry the county by 275 to 300 majority while A. E. Davis, for superintendent public instruction, has a small majority; J. W. Davis has probably from 30 to 40 majority; Hinson Thomas, John T. Bartleson, Wm. H. Dempsey and Jessa Hardley have strong majorities; Gabriel and Daran are almost neck and neck, the last figuring Davis from 2 to 5 majority. Jere Fryer and Jacob Suter are probably elected supervisors.

Sold Out.

Taking advantage of our absence certain parties, who professed to be democrats as well as personal friends of ours, sold us out here at Florence and threw to our opponent over forty Spanish votes that had been pledged to us. They accomplished this treachery by making our Spanish friends believe that our name was on the ticket and the latter are still laboring under the impression that they voted for us. These votes make a difference of over 80 in Florence instead of 39, the majority we received here. It would also have given us a very neat majority in the county. We were also sold out at some other points and as the matter now stands, Mr. Davis will probably have a majority in the county ranging from 30 to 40 and this may give him the election, but it will take the official count in Pima to determine. He will have a small majority in Tucson, but the outside precincts with a very few exceptions are strongly democratic and at last accounts we were eleven ahead in that county with some of the democratic strongholds to hear from. If beaten, we shall have the satisfaction of knowing that it was only through the treachery of pretended friends and the circulation of lies at the polls after it was too late to contradict them.

Casa Grande District.

The Chicago Mining Review contains the following about the Casa Grande District, this county: The Western Union crops up from 10 to 40 feet wide, for the whole length of the claim. The Mineral World is a big blow out, carrying gold and silver. The Anglo-Saxon goes 45 per cent, copper, \$30 in silver with a trace of gold. The White Flag is a large, well-defined ledge of carbonate and galena ore on which there is a 20-foot shaft, all in ore. On the Silver Ball, is a 60-foot shaft, on a 9-foot ledge, very rich in carbonate and malleable silver. On the Oriana are several shafts, all in ore—chlorides and black sulphurets—which is being shipped; and yields from \$400 to \$500 per ton. No walls have yet been found to the ledge of the Jack Rabbit, but there is a pay streak, two feet in width, from which 8 to 10 tons of ore have been shipped, that went from \$1,000 to \$1,500 per ton. In the North Star and Lone Star, the ledge, which is from 7 to 10 feet wide, is opened up for the whole length of the claim. It assays from \$25 to \$30 in silver, on the surface.

Trouble Brewing at San Carlos. The Graham County Times of November 3rd has the following pieces of news: "Startling rumors of a threatened outbreak at San Carlos are rife. It is said that great dissatisfaction is felt by the Indians at the course pursued by Crook in forcing them up to count every morning, and that an outbreak may be expected at any time if the course is persisted in. One report even goes so far as to state that Crook has been warned off the reserve, and that the chiefs have told him that if he does not leave the reservation immediately he will be killed. "Later news received this morning somewhat confirms the above. Crook has discontinued counting, giving as a reason that he has got all on the reservation that are possible, and that he now knows the exact number and who they are. He went to the White mountains on a big hunt this morning.

A Tell-Tale Letter. Reynert says that he went to South America for "pleasure and recreation," but the following letter, the original of which is in our possession, will show that he went there to escape arrest. It was addressed to him at San Francisco in 1877: LAW OFFICE OF AUGUST REYBERT, 132 Nassau St., New York, 1877. I regret to say I have not the law books any longer. Family pictures are all safe. A deskroom with use of library can easily be hired of course. The Storm claim is not in shape of judgment, but by special term order filed and docketed. Johnson don't know more about it than I do. I don't suppose the order could be enforced in S. F. unless by commencing anew, but an action could be brought and the only thing to be gained would be delay. It is best to settle. I have told Waring that Mrs. S. need entertain no hopes of ever getting the claim paid by you, because your losses and imbricatures, caused by the Hercules &c., were too heavy and manifold to justify the belief of their being discharged in full. Besides you are in Chili and intended remaining there. I don't suppose they will accept my offer of \$750. Then let us go a little higher if it meets with your approval. Time and some grace in meeting the installments. I shall be particular about obtaining any chance of their getting back their arrest remedy in case of failure to make punctual payments. Of course people will soon hear of your being in S. F. and then Mrs. S. will put her back upon us. Please write me soon. Your affectionate nephew, A. REYBERT.

P. S.—Weinberger, Stallneck, G. W. Stevens, Judge Spaulding and Morrell are all dead. The men mentioned in the postscript above, as being dead are some of the victims of Reynert's Hercules Insurance scheme. The Mrs. Storm mentioned here, is the widow whose child Reynert robbed of \$3,000. She was married to Storm after the death of her first husband, but was divorced from him and now goes by the name of her first husband, Miller.
