LIBERTAD (Salvador), June 26.—During a ball given at the President's residence in the Capitol, on the 22d inst., in celebration of the anniversary of the triumphal entry of General Menendez, General Melillo Marcial suddenly entered the ballroom about 11 o'clock, and announced on behalf of his chief, General Ezeta, who had arrived with 6000 men from Santa Ana, a demand for the President's resignation. At this juncture General Martinez, Commander of the Government forces, who was sick in an upper story, requested an audience with General Marcial. An altercation ensued between Martinez and Marcial, resulting in the latter being shot and killed. Ezeta's soldiers then entered the ballroom and captured the barracks. Twenty-three persons were killed. It is asserted that the President died on the following day from heart disease, aggravated by excitement. General Melillo is at present directing all the different branches of the Government, and general order prevails.

SAN SALVADOR, June 26.—The Supreme Provisional Government decided yesterday to place for the present the different branches of the Administration under one portfolio, which will be in charge of General Melillo. General Melillo for twelve years President of Salvador and would have been continued in that office had he declined in consequence of the fact that his private affairs demanded more of his attention. He is the owner of fourteen coffee estates and he paid to the Pacific Mail Steamship Company in freight some \$12,000 in ten years. His wife was formerly Miss Lincoln of New York City.

THE MEXICAN REVOLUTION. CITY OF MEXICO, June 26.—Monterey telegrams say that the revolutionists, under Ruiz Sandoval, attempted to cross the Rio Grande yesterday from the United States, six miles west of Laredo. They were driven back by Mexican forces. Sandoval and six men were captured by the Chief of Police.

MANTON MARBLE.

The Editor of the World Talks About the Silver Question. PARIS, June 26.—Manton Marble was interviewed on the proposed silver legislation by the United States Congress. He said: "From the standpoint of the Treasury, or finance, or from a business point of view, the bill is a very dangerous scheme. Any silver purchase scheme will complicate the silver question without solving it. If there is to be free coinage of silver, it will be the best money in the world." He answered: "Gold and silver coin, equivalent by law, with equal value at weight ratio of 1 to 15 of full legal tender to any amount, and representative paper certificates, not provided for by law." "What is the political silver question?" "The answer was: "The Democratic State and Congressional conventions can raise the matter of free coinage and carry it into effect."

MUST PAY UP.

Russia Wants Turkey to Settle the War.

LONDON, June 26.—Great importance is attached to Russia's demand upon Turkey for the war indemnity by the Cabinets of Europe, especially Austria. Russia has been as lenient as possible in the payments stipulated at the close of the Russo-Turkish war, and the arrears now amount to a sum that is almost hopeless for Turkey to discharge. The Sultan, indeed, has virtually disregarded, although he has not formally repudiated, the obligation, and therefore the indemnity now comes with a force all the more starting. As Turkey cannot fulfill the demand Russia will have to go to war with her some other way. The opinion in Vienna is that the way chosen will be a military one. Preparations are being made in the Balkans in the event of a hostile movement on the part of Russia.

ENGLAND'S WARSHIPS.
