ATORNADO'S RURY. Great Destruction to the City of Perugia.

Buildings Wrecked and a Large Number of Persons Injured. A Noted Hungarian Town Entirely Burned. The Potato Blight in Ireland. Italy's Speech.

ROME, Aug. 26.—The city of Perugia and the surrounding country was visited by a tornado to-day. Four churches in the city were blown down and many houses wrecked. A large number of persons were injured.

Perugia is a city of Central Italy, in Umbria, capital of a province, forty-eight miles by rail southeast of Arezzo, and ten miles east of the Lake of Perugia, on the south declivity of the Apennines. Its population is 18750, and it is enclosed by walls. The public buildings comprise a large cathedral, with fine paintings and a library of rare manuscripts; unward of 100 other churches; a city hall, an exchange elaborately and gorgeously frescoed; an academy of fine arts, several private palaces, a well-endowed university, founded in 1230, with museums of antiquities and minerals; a botanical garden, a lunatic asylum and two theaters. There are also several schools, a hospital, a splendidly sculptured fountain and two celebrated fairs of Etruscan architecture.

Perugia has few manufactures, beyond some soap works and distilleries. It exports wine and liquors. It has a trade in wine, oil, corn, fruits, etc., but its fairs in August and November for cattle and merchandise are frequented by a concourse of people from all parts of Central Italy, and numerous visitors are attracted to the city by its agreeable society and abundant works of art.

ARBITRATION PROPOSED. Instructions to Minister Mizner From the State Department.

GUATEMALA, Aug. 26.—Instructions were received at the United States Legation here to-day addressed to Minister Mizner. The communication came from the State Department at Washington and directed Minister Mizner to propose arbitration for a settlement of the difficulty between Guatemala and the United States.

First.—It is stipulated that if General Escobar accepts the proposals the armies of both countries shall be withdrawn from the respective countries and to be disbanded.

Second.—Vice-President Araya is to hold the Presidency of San Salvador for twenty days, and General Escobar is to hold office until the close of the present year.

Third.—A general amnesty shall be declared by the Government.

Fourth.—General Escobar is to remain at the head of the standing army of Salvador.

General Escobar is to be tried by a court of honor, and if found guilty he is to be executed. Cotiti is here trying to make new arrangements, but there are doubts as to whether they will be successful.

CITY OF MEXICO, Aug. 26.—The Guatemalan Minister here says that General Escobar has accepted the proposals of the United States, and that he has ordered his forces to gain advance on the frontiers of the respective countries and to induce General Escobar to sign the protocol.
