DURHAM (Iowa), Oct. 5.—The house of John McFee was discovered to be on fire at an early hour this morning. When the firemen arrived McFee jumped from a window in the upper story to the ground and was seriously injured. The flames were quickly extinguished and the remainder of the unfortunate family were removed. Mrs. McFee and her daughter Rose, aged 18 years, were dead. A young daughter, Bertha, aged 16 years, and a son, Charles, aged 5 years, were unconscious. The boy died this afternoon and the girl cannot live. McFee says he was awakened by a sense of suffocation and found the room filled with smoke. He aroused his wife and they groped their way to the window, through which he leaped or fell. The wife was close behind him, but when she reached the window she was unable to get back to try to save them and perished. When found the family was in a group, with their arms about each other.

GEORGE B. GRAHAM DEAD.

It Was Not a Case of Suicide, but of Melancholy.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 5.—George B. Graham, one of Baltimore's wealthiest and most widely-known citizens, and a cousin of the late Alexander Graham Bell, died today at his country residence. Mr. Graham was shaving on the evening of September 25th, and accidentally cut his throat with a razor. The wound was not serious, but he was greatly exhausted when found lying on the floor of his room. He suffered long time from malaria fever, and to the effects of malarial fever his family attributes his death. He was 60 years of age. Graham, a prominent member of the banking firm of Alexander Brown & Sons, had attempted suicide by cutting his throat with a razor. 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POSTAL TELEGRAPH.

Arguments of Postmaster-General Wanamaker.

The Letter He Recently Addressed to the Chairman of the House Committee.

How He Championed the Cause of the People—Constitutionality of the Proposed Law.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Postmaster-General Wanamaker to-night made public a letter recently addressed to the Chairman of the House Committee on Postoffice, embodying an elaborate argument in favor of his limited plan of postal telegraph. Appended to the letter is a mass of matter pertaining to the subject, making altogether 223 pages, closely printed. The Postmaster-General in his letter says in part: "After standing for the year past in the midst of a controversy over postal telegraph that for over forty years has gone with a sharp, one-sided, and unrelenting edge, I am more than ever convinced of the wisdom and practicality of restoring the telegraph to the postal service and make it what it was originally intended to be—a part of the postal system. I say this after closely studying the arguments against my plan, and after having been in a great telegraph company which is now its only visible opponent.
