

MARKHAM'S OBSERVATIONS

Aspicious Commencement of the Southern Tour.

A Pleasing Reception and an Open-Air Meeting at Santa Cruz.

Grand Demonstration at Watsonville—The Opera House Crowded With an Enthusiastic Audience.

WATSONVILLE, Oct. 20.—Colonel Markham's southern tour has been inaugurated under the most favorable auspices, and the reception given him in the north in no ways exceeded the magnificent demonstration and enthusiasm which has greeted him to-day.

Convincing proof has been furnished to-day that Santa Cruz is firmly in line for the gallant standard-bearer who is destined to lead the Republican hosts to a sweeping victory, and that an increased majority may be looked for.

It has been given a splendid ovation at every point to-day, and he is now on his way to Watsonville, where he will be met by a delegation of prominent citizens, among whom were W. P. Cooper, W. D. Storey, W. H. Galbraith, H. E. Crane, A. D. H. Wiley, F. Robinson, and others.

The party were driven in carriages to the Ocean House, where lunch was served, after which a meeting was held in front of the Ocean House, where a large and enthusiastic audience was in attendance, and cheer after cheer went up.

Colonel Markham spoke first and delivered an unusually able address, in which he made a special plea for his friend, Lord, who, it is evident, has been a decided loss to the Republican strength.

Markham was frequently interrupted by applause, and he was followed by a body of army officers. He was followed by Mr. Lord in a lengthy address which was well received, and showed the hearty approval of the people on the god will of the people of this section.

After the meeting the party were driven to the pavilion, where they inspected the fruit display, in which Colonel Markham took the liveliest interest.

On the return to the hotel an informal reception was held, and hundreds of people gathered to greet the party.

At 10 o'clock the party left for Watsonville, where they were met by a large and enthusiastic crowd of people.

When Colonel Markham stepped from the train he was surrounded at once by enthusiastic admirers and literally borne to the carriage.

The streets were lined with a cheering crowd of humanity, and an especial feature of the reception was the presence of the young men of the city, who were dressed in their best attire.

Markham was escorted to the Mansion House, where each member of the party was given a warm grasp of the hand and a few words of encouragement.

After the meeting the party were driven to the hotel, where they were met by a large and enthusiastic crowd of people.

Markham, too, was given an enthusiastic reception, and made a good impression on those who met him.

In the evening the Opera House was jammed to suffocation, there being fully two thousand people present to cheer their favorite son of the North.

Markham acted as President of the evening, and when he presented the resolutions which were given an ovation.

It was a splendid demonstration of popular enthusiasm and devotion to the Republican cause.

Markham was followed by George A. Knight in a characteristic speech bristling with facts and carrying conviction with it.

In the morning a meeting was held at 6:45 o'clock for Gilroy, where a reception will be given, and then, on the afternoon, will reach San Jose in the afternoon.
