

SPORTING EVENTS.

THE SECOND CONTEST. The second exhibition which will be given by the club in the new year should be the most interesting event in the line of athletic sports ever witnessed in this city. It will be a meeting between Kilrain and Godfrey. The latter has given the old club members an opportunity of seeing him at his best, although he failed to reach the goal of a successful competitor. He is expected to make a favorable impression on the best judges of pugilistic art by retiring with a profit when he had found that his opponent was his master. Godfrey met and defeated Peter Jackson, who has yet to meet his master, notwithstanding the fact that a number of people are of the opinion that a victory would not be in it against the demon, little Peter. Francis Slavin, who began his career at the California Athletic Club, has discovered his "iron" man, the more fashionable of whom steps in between the saint and the pugilist.

DEMPSEY AND FITZSIMMONS. The following is a copy of the articles of agreement which will govern the fight between Dempsey and Fitzsimmons at New Orleans on January 14th next.

We, the undersigned, John A. Dempsey of Portland, Oregon, and Robert Fitzsimmons of New Zealand, do hereby agree to a money fight on the night of January 14, 1891, at 9 o'clock sharp, for a purse of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), of which the winner shall receive five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and the loser the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

The fight shall be fought in the city of New Orleans, Louisiana, at the Casino, and the contestants reserving the right of selecting the referee, except in case of a draw, to the approval of the club.

The referee to be selected by the club, subject to the approval of the club, shall be John Fitzsimmons. Both men to weigh in five minutes before the start of the fight.

Neither one to weigh over or above his limit, and fifty-four pounds (154 pounds). To guarantee good time in carrying out the above, both as to weight and appearance at the proper time and place, each will carry with him one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in the hands of the officers of the club, to be used in case of a draw, to be divided equally between the two contestants.

The referee to be selected by the club, subject to the approval of the club, shall be John Fitzsimmons. Both men to weigh in five minutes before the start of the fight.

As will be seen by the above the size of the mittens must be satisfactory to Dempsey, who will train in the morning and side rest within ten hours' ride of the place in which he will fight. The question of compensation will be left to the arbitration of the referee.

On the 7th of January special car, under the management of little Willie Vee, will leave this city for New Orleans. Several members of the California Athletic Club will accompany the car to see the fight.

THE WAGE-WORKERS.

Puzzling Action of the American Labor Federation. Officers Elected by the Striking Iron Molders and Core-Makers—Opposition Slipped After the "Arbeiter Zeitung."

A telegram from Detroit announcing that the American Federation of Labor had suspended the "Trades and Labor Council of California" until the subordinate union had paid its assessment, was read and discussed at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Council of Federated Trades yesterday.

The dispatch could not rightly be interpreted as the only body on the Coast that could be classed as the Labor Council of California is the Council of Federated Trades, which has paid all dues to the American Federation up to January 1, 1891.

A telegram was sent to President Gompers asking him to give an explanation of the affair. Some of the committee thought the dispatch a mistake owing to the confusion of names, while others believe the national body is trying to compel local union to pay its dues by making the country body compel the union to pay its assessment.

Consul Bowman's Report of the Inundations. Hundreds of Miles of Cultivated Land Under Water and Crops Destroyed—Appeal for Aid to Relief Suffering.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10, 1890.—United States Consul William Bowman in a report to the Secretary of State, dated September 4, 1890, from the Consulate at Hankow, and made public to-day, throws some light upon the disastrous floods which overtook the lower part of the Yangtze River in the season.
